POTHOLE PURGE A PRIORITY

Extra council funding is being used to repair the county’s roads damaged by the winter weather.

A combination of sub-zero temperatures, rain and snow throughout winter, with repeated cycles of freezing and thawing, have taken their toll on the county’s road network and led to a big increase in the number of potholes being identified throughout Northumberland.

This damage has been further worsened by the effects of the ‘Beast from the East’ winter storm.

Each year the council undertakes a major investment programme to maintain and improve its highway network, with over £23m being spent in 2017/18.

The council was awarded an extra £930,000 Pothole Action Fund grant for

2017/18 from the Department for Transport, and the authority has also agreed to plough in an extra £420,000 in contingency funding so that it can improve the condition of the county’s road surfaces.

The council is also writing to the government for additional funding to help repair further damage caused by the ‘Beast from the East’.

The current funding is being spent on increased road inspections, extra equipment and resources and a range of repair work, where possible using techniques that provide for a longer-term fix where the damaged patch of road surface is cut out and repaired.

With over 5,000kms of road to look after, eradicating every single pothole isn’t possible, but this £1.3m investment means the council will be repairing thousands of defects ahead of the summer season.

LOCAL FUND SUPPORTS ROAD REPAIRS

A pilot scheme was introduced last summer to give local areas a greater say on road improvements in their communities.

The five Local Area Councils were each allocated £100,000 to be used to permanently repair key problem areas suffering from repeated potholes or localised drainage issues.

Since the scheme was introduced over 120 repair areas have been carried out throughout the county.





5 Say no to disposable straws and cutlery




6 Skip the plastic produce bags

GARDEN GREEN SCHEME STARTS AGAIN



Our garden waste collection service has started up again.

If you are a gardener and haven't already done so, why not join thousands of other residents in the county and take part in our green recycling scheme which provides a convenient way to dispose of cut grass, leaves, cuttings and small branches.

We collect the garden waste fortnightly from March until November and take it away to be recycled into reusable compost and soil conditioner.

Residents who used the service last year have been sent an invitation to renew. There is an annual charge of £36 for each wheeled bin (the equivalent of £1.80 per collection) so we can cover our costs.

If you don't or can't use the garden waste collection you can take your garden waste to any household waste recovery centre, free of charge, or even try home composting.

May Bank Holiday bins

Throughout the weeks commencing May 7 and May 28 all household bins will be emptied one day later.

If your bin is normally collected on a Monday, it will be collected on a Tuesday. Tuesday bins will be collected on a Wednesday and so on.

Please place your rubbish, recycling or garden waste bins out for collection by 7am one day later than your usual day of collection.



Northumberland volunteers join BIG spring clean

Dozens of Northumberland residents gave up their free time in March to clean up their local neighbourhood in support of the national Great British Spring Clean campaign.

Some events were delayed due to the bad weather but schools, community groups, businesses, town councils and enthusiastic individuals still collected hundreds of sacks of rubbish for the community clean-up.

Northumberland County Council supported many of the groups and individuals by providing litter pickers, hi-visibility vests, gloves, and rubbish bags and by picking up the refuse afterwards.

Sculpture trail in Berwick Parks

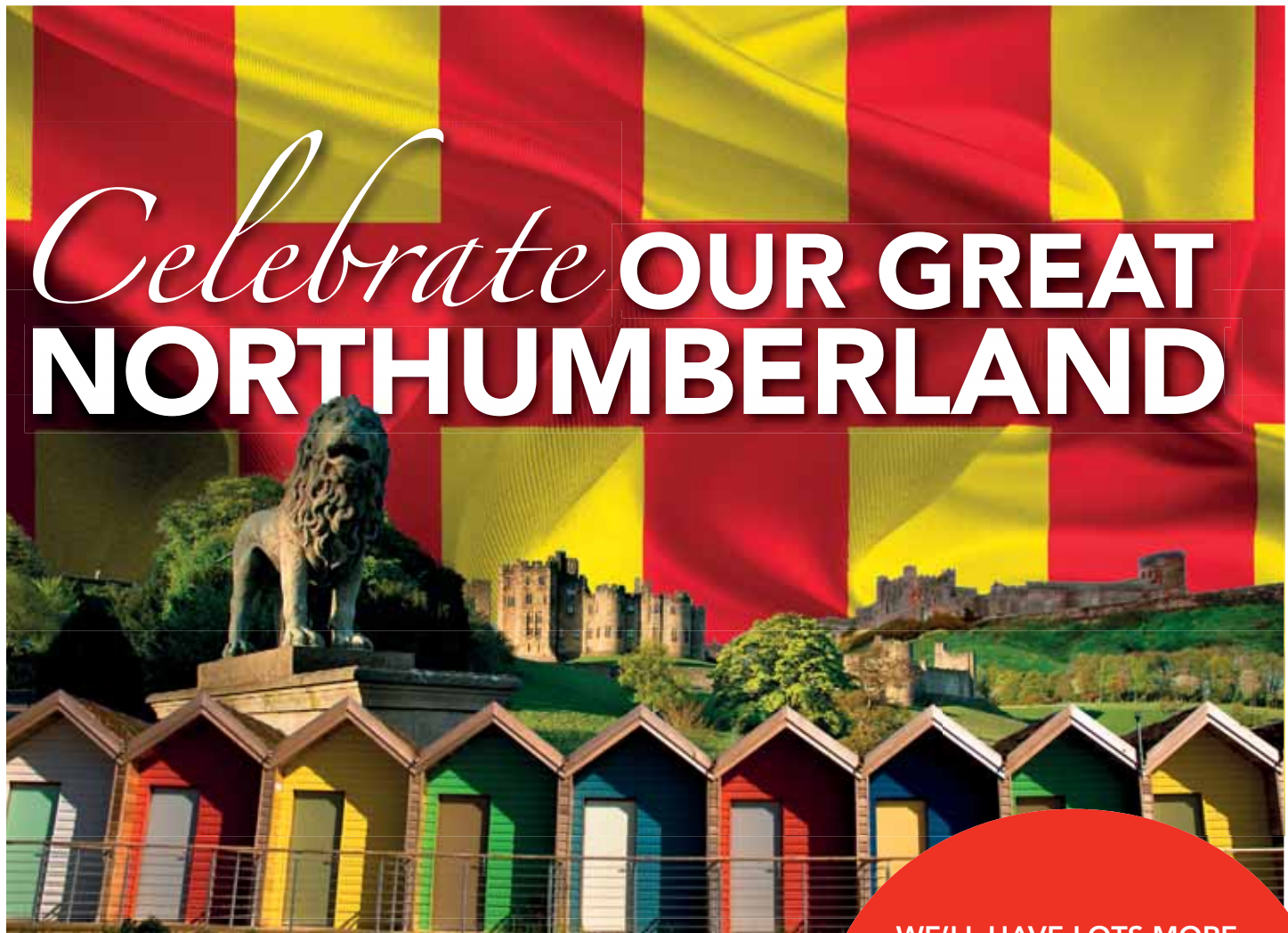
Wooden sculptures, designed by local school children and brought to life by sculptor David Gross are now in pride of place in Berwick's Castle Parks.

Schools gear up for BIKEABILITY CYCLE TRAINING

We probably all remember the good old cycling proficiency lessons at school when we got to ride our bikes around the playground once school had finished. Well Bikeability, the modern equivalent, is taking place in schools across the county.

The scheme is designed to give the next generation of children the skills and confidence to ride bikes safely on today's roads. They receive professional training to improve their cycling technique, understand the dangers of the road, know what hazards to look out for, and what road markings and traffic systems mean.

This year over 2,000 children in the county will be taking part in the government funded scheme.

Community grants

Our community chest scheme offers grants of up to £5,000 to help voluntary groups, charities and young people deliver activities that benefit residents and communities.

There is also a £200 grant called 'Help For You' available to assist under 18s in pursuing a particular ambition - whether it be sporting, musical or academic.

ON YOUR DOORSTEP... WILDLIFE WATCH



The puffin is one of the country's favourite birds and there are few better places to see them up close than on the Farne Islands off Seahouses.

This rare bird with its beautiful markings, strikingly coloured bill and almost comic gait returns each year to the Farnes to breed. This is generally between April and late July with the peak breeding season being in May and June. For the remainder of the year, the birds fly out to sea, overwintering on the water, only returning to land each year for a short window to breed and raise their young.

Regular boat trips head out to the Farnes to see the puffins, seals and other nesting birds.

New Chief Executive to lead Active Northumberland



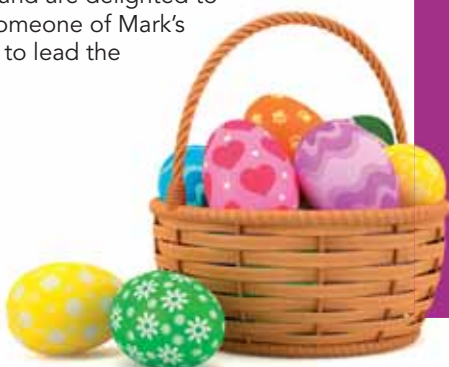
A new chief executive has been appointed to take over at the helm of Active Northumberland.

NEW POOL BASED FITNESS CLASSES AND LESSONS

Why not take the plunge and try one of our fun and innovative low impact exercise classes that use water resistance to improve aerobic fitness, core strength and weight loss?

The pool based classes are available at Hexham, Blyth, Ashington and Ponteland leisure centres on a rotation basis.

- Float fit - a high intensity 30 minute session that uses a float called an AquaBase board.
- Hydro pole - a core and upper body workout using a dance pole in the water.

- Aqua jog - a low impact running session.
- Hydro HIIT - a high intensity 30 minute session targeting aerobic fitness and core strength.
- Hydro fighter - a full body cardio and strength workout using fighter moves with the added resistance of water.



ARE YOU SCARED OF WATER?

- Swimming for the Terrified - introducing non swimmers into the water building on confidence, basic skills and safety.
- Flat Out and Floating - learn to float, relax and move confidently in the water.

The sessions are part of Active Northumberland's Take the Plunge initiative which is funded by Sport England. It is aimed at encouraging more people, especially adults, to use their local swimming pool and feel the benefits - both physical and social - that swimming brings.

HEALTHY LIFESTYLE SCHEME

to help reduce diabetes risk



An intensive lifestyle programme will target people at risk of Type 2 diabetes as part of a new drive against the disease in Northumberland.

While Type 1 diabetes cannot be prevented and is not linked to lifestyle, Type 2 is largely preventable through lifestyle changes. In the UK, around 22,000 people with Type 2 diabetes die early every year.

The Healthier You: NHS Diabetes Prevention Programme identifies people at high risk and offers them support to make positive changes to their lifestyle to reduce their risk of developing Type 2 diabetes.

Those at high risk will be contacted by their GP or practice nurse for a blood test, or referral, for free, personalised support including advice on healthy eating, weight loss and physical activity.

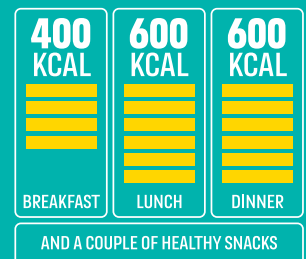

Help us shape the county's future

WE WANT YOUR VIEWS

We're looking for input from residents and businesses to help us shape the new Local Plan that will set out future housing, business and community development in the county.

WHAT IS THE LOCAL PLAN?

The Local Plan provides a framework to guide and promote future development of homes and employment sites in Northumberland while supporting sustainable communities and protecting the county's unique countryside.

HOUSING - We need to improve the housing choice across Northumberland to meet the diverse needs of existing and future communities - but we want to build in the right places. This means we can ensure that vital community facilities such as schools, GP surgeries, roads and public transport links are in place to support existing and new residents.

JOBS - An important part of the Plan will be promoting economic growth. The Plan will need to ensure that land is available to support new employment opportunities and that the right jobs can be provided in the right places for local residents.

WHY IS IT SO IMPORTANT?

The Local Plan will guide decisions on whether or not planning applications should be granted permission and gives us the power to refuse inappropriate development. It will also provide clarity to the community, landowners, developers and investors.

HOW TO GIVE YOUR VIEWS

We are making this consultation different, by taking a new and interactive approach to consultation with an online survey. It includes an interactive map on which you are asked to mark where you feel the most appropriate places for housing and employment development are. To help guide you, the map will have outlined on it areas of constraint, for example green belts and areas of conservation or special interest.

Improvements underway at regeneration company

Plans for a revitalised regeneration company in Northumberland that will work for all the county are well underway.

That is the message from the Arch Board which is working to establish a new organisation that will solely focus on Northumberland-based regeneration, job creation, affordable housing and economic growth.

The new company will be closely aligned to the county council and operate as a commercial organisation to deliver a range of projects.

In particular the company will:

-  Help deliver affordable housing
-  Focus on regeneration including new industrial and commercial schemes that will maximise job creation and investment.
-  Work to help existing business to flourish and to attract inward investment to produce more highly skilled jobs.

Work is continuing on numerous projects across the county, including the redevelopment of Bedlington and Ashington town centres and the Coquet Enterprise Park in Amble.

Chair of the Board,
Richard Wearmouth said:

“ We want residents to know the council and the team at the regeneration company are determined to establish an organisation that works for the interests of all Northumberland and that the work to achieve this is now well advanced.

Working to balance budget and banish Post-16 bus charges



Northumberland County Council has agreed a budget to save £65m over the next four years while making ambitious plans for the future.

Councillors approved efficiencies of £8.2m for the coming year, £21.1m in 2019-20, and rising to £65.1m over the term of the Medium Term Financial Plan 2018-2022.

The next three years will be more challenging than ever, and councillors warned it may have an impact on the way it delivers services.

To protect vital services and significant demand in services, the council has reluctantly decided to a Council Tax rise of 2.99%. While this rise is in line with inflation, it equates to 85 pence per household per week for a Band D property.

Council Leader Peter Jackson said:

“We’re still very ambitious for our future, and for the future of the people of Northumberland, and our capital programme of £588m is the biggest ever delivered in the county.

“Over the coming years we pledge to continue investing in Northumberland’s future and making sure we get a fair deal for the whole county - one that works for everyone.”

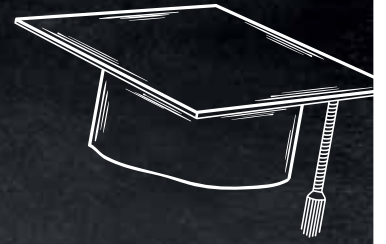
Meanwhile the council’s plans to reintroduce free post-16 transport for students have moved a step nearer.

Public consultation has taken place on removing the charges before new arrangements can be introduced, ready for the start of the new school year in September.

The Council is committed to abolishing the charge for students meeting the eligibility criteria, with a one-off £50 fee being introduced to help cover costs.

EARN WHILE YOU LEARN

on apprenticeship scheme



Do you want to earn while you learn? If so Northumberland County Council's apprenticeship scheme may be for you.

The council is currently recruiting 220 new apprentices to take up positions across a wide range of local services including construction, customer services, leisure, adult social care, IT and horticulture.

The apprenticeship programme is open to anyone from entry to degree level and provides the opportunity to develop skills and experience while working towards achieving nationally recognised qualifications. Apprenticeships aren't just for young people - they also suit adults who may be out of work or looking for a career change.

Over the last five years, the local authority has taken on more than 1,000 apprentices.

“ Through my apprenticeship I'm training for my National Pool Lifeguard Qualification and am really loving it. The training includes swimming, timed swims and first aid. I am also learning lots of other skills at the leisure centre too. ”



Chloe, 17 is an apprentice at Concordia Leisure Centre in Cramlington.

“ My apprenticeship is very hands on, I get to do all sorts of things, I'm kept busy and learn loads. If someone else was thinking of choosing an apprenticeship I would tell them to go for it. ”

Become a retained firefighter

Northumberland Fire and Rescue Service is recruiting retained firefighters right across the county. Could you be one of them?

WHAT DOES IT INVOLVE?

Retained firefighters are men and women who combine their day jobs or duties while being 'on call' for the fire service, ready to respond to emergencies when they are needed.

A retained firefighter provides the same level of emergency service as their full time colleagues, but on a part-time basis.

They attend fire and road traffic accidents and a range of other emergencies and also play an important role in community engagement activities.

COUNTRY PARKS IMPROVEMENTS

Ambitious plans to improve three of Northumberland's favourite country parks have been approved.

Druridge Bay, Plessey Woods and Bolam Lake Country Parks attract hundreds of thousands of visitors each year from both the county and further afield and are havens for a variety of wildlife.

The council has now agreed to invest almost £1m to significantly improve the three parks with a range of new facilities.

DEVO DEAL SET FOR SUMMER

A devolution deal for the North of Tyne could be just months away after strong support from the region to move forward.

The Cabinets of Northumberland, Newcastle and North Tyneside have submitted a detailed report on public feedback to Secretary of State Sajid Javid and all being well he will put orders in place to set up a new North of Tyne Combined Authority by summer 2018.

The financial future of Alnwick Playhouse has been secured for both residents and visitors.

The council will grant a new 50 year lease to the Playhouse Trust to enable them to continue to operate the theatre, studio, bar and an expanded cafe facility.

Meanwhile the council will use the remaining part of the ground floor to provide a library, tourist information and customer service facilities. Work on the £2.5m project will start in the summer and is due for completion in May 2019.
