Tall Ships net a multi-million pound boost for the county

The North Sea Tall Ships Regatta held in Blyth last summer boosted Northumberland's economy by a staggering £13.5million.

The spectacular four day event saw nearly half a million people flock to the town - spending money in both Blyth and across the wider county.

The economic impact has been verified by independent research, which also shows that there was an extremely high satisfaction rate from visitors to the event.

A remarkable 99% of those attending the regatta described it as 'very good' or 'good' – while more than eight out of ten visitors from other parts of the UK said they would be more likely to return to the area, and spend, as a result.

Council Leader, Grant Davey said: "Benefits from holding the Tall Ships event in Northumberland have far exceeded our initial expectations.

"This world class event produced a huge economic impact for the county as a whole, and particularly so in Blyth and surrounding areas.

"These figures more than demonstrate the importance of bringing high profile events to Northumberland.

"Feedback at the event itself was marvellous, and this independent research confirms how much people really enjoyed it.

"The legacy is not just in finance and memories however - it also gave opportunities for volunteers and trainees to become involved in learning and in gaining life skills of huge benefit to them in the future."

ECONOMY BOOST OF £13.5M



The Tour of Britain, the UK's biggest and most prestigious cycle race is set to return to Northumberland this September.

The county is to host day two of the race on 4th September which will include a start in Kielder and a finish in Blyth passing through the Northumberland National Park and many rural and urban communities along the route.

The Tour is set to be broadcast in over 120 countries, including live coverage on ITV4, which will raise the profile of the county to an international audience.

Northumberland County Council has worked with Active Northumberland, sponsors Northumbrian Water and race organisers SweetSpot to bring the race to Northumberland.

In 2015, The Tour of Britain swept through the county creating a wave of excitement as some of the world's top cyclists, including UK favourite Sir Bradley Wiggins, cycled through our communities. Residents and businesses dressed the route in the distinctive red and gold colours of the Northumberland flag and thousands of spectators lined the route to cheer on the cyclists and give them a fantastic welcome.

The eight-stage race runs from Sunday 3 to Sunday 10 of September.





Leader of Northumberland County Council, Grant Davey said:

The race will showcase our county, heritage and iconic landmarks and bring major investment into the county, while providing a fantastic opportunity for us all to enjoy a wonderful international sporting spectacle.

A new chapter for libraries across Northumberland



Libraries are being integrated with leisure centres — bringing a host of benefits for book borrowers and other users, including better facilities, extended opening hours and access to more services under one roof.

Newbiggin Library moved into its new, permanent home on the ground floor of the Sports and Community Centre, at the end of January 2017, giving visitors a bigger, brighter, more modern and welcoming library space with better facilities.

A year after its move to the £21million purposebuilt complex at Ashington Leisure Centre, membership levels have soared at **Ashington Library**. The library - which boasts a huge range of books, an IT hub with 18 computer terminals and a bespoke children's library - has attracted over 2,000 new members and seen book borrowing levels increase by 25%.

Last July, **Cramlington Library** moved from its premises on Forum Way into a newly created space at the front of the Concordia Leisure Centre building as part of a £3.5 million transformation programme. Visitors now have access to customer services, gym, new soft play facilities, a Clip 'n' Climb experience, spa facility and a 10 lane bowling alley.

Ponteland Library moved from Thornhill Road into the leisure centre's reception area and former creche in November 2016 where it will stay until its new shared site development, which includes new school buildings, leisure and information services, is completed in 2019.

Councillor Val Tyler, Cabinet Member for Arts, Leisure and Culture, said: "By integrating our libraries with leisure centre services, we can offer an improved service, longer opening hours and better accessibility and convenience for residents. Integrating services in this way has had proven results, with clear benefits for residents and cost effectiveness for the council."

Library and leisure services are managed by Active Northumberland on behalf of Northumberland County Council.

With 450 weekly fitness classes on offer - including **Body Combat. Kickboxing.** Salsacise and Zumba - keeping fit doesn't have to be boring.



One class proving popular with members in Ashington, Blyth, Cramlington and Newbiggin is Clubbercise. Suitable for beginners and more experienced fitness fans, Clubbercise uses simple, energetic dance routines using glow sticks to club classic anthems from the 90s to the latest chart hits.

Instructor, Amy Fenwick, said: "I get such a buzz from teaching Clubbercise. It's great when I can see the smile on people's faces and can hear them singing along to the tunes. I also feel like I am making a difference to people's lives. which is fantastic."

Clubbercise is a fantastic way to get fit and. more importantly, it's fun. The classes take place in a darkened room so there's no need for people to feel self-conscious.

Loren Sayer, who attends Clubbercise at Ashington Leisure Centre, said: "Clubbercise is fab, the atmosphere is electric and is better than any night out. You are having that much fun you forget you are exercising. I can't think of a better way to de-stress after a day at work."



An hour spent swimming can burn more calories than the same time spent lifting weights in the gym and its low impact nature makes swimming an ideal way for people of all ages and abilities to stay active.

One member who is embracing the benefits of swimming is 83-year-old Pearl Hall, from Prudhoe, who regularly swims at Prudhoe Waterworld and takes part in Active Life Aquafit classes.

She said: "Swimming gives me a gentle workout without putting too much pressure on my body. I've been able to slowly build up my pace and I feel fitter and healthier as a result. The facilities are fantastic and I really enjoy the

social aspect of the agua classes. The instructors and fellow swimmers are supportive and encouraging, which makes a huge difference."

Active Northumberland runs a series of Active Life sessions, tailored to help members build up their fitness at their own pace. Swimming pools cater for swimmers of all ages and abilities.

Banish the fear

As well as improving fitness levels, exercise is known to reduce anxiety, boost energy and self-confidence and make you feel happier. Heading to the gym doesn't have to be a daunting experience.

With experienced staff on hand to help you achieve anything from weight loss to toning, all Active Northumberland members can take advantage of an induction and a follow up session with a trainer.

Dawn Barrett, health and fitness manager at Ponteland Leisure Centre, said: "It's important for our members to feel relaxed and comfortable when they come to one of our gyms and that's why we're here to offer advice and support when needed."

Jennifer Liddell, 59, from Ponteland, said: "I wasn't very confident when I first came to the gym but the staff have been brilliant and really put me at ease. There's a great atmosphere in the gym and I've made some good friends."

Active Northumberland members can use any of its 14 leisure centres, with no time restrictions or extra cost – all for £32 a month (£26 concessions and 14–21-year-olds) and no joining fee. Young adult members (aged 14 & 15) can attend the gym during specified dedicated sessions.

Bypass to *speed up* county's economy

The county's economy could be on track for a near £50million windfall over the coming decades when Morpeth's Northern Bypass opens this Spring.

Many key sections of work on Morpeth's £30m bypass are now complete, with engineers working on final parts of the scheme before it opens to traffic.

Forecasts suggest that over the coming years the scheme has the potential to trigger the creation of over 8,000 jobs locally, with an estimated £47million economic benefit to the county.

One of the largest current road projects in the region, the ambitious scheme will also cut congestion in Morpeth and reduce travel time and costs between the A1 and South East Northumberland.

The two-year construction period has involved some state-of-the-art computer modelling techniques along with some top-spec engineering along its 2.4 mile length!

A different budget for different times

commitment to investing in the county through its £381m capital **Northumberland County Council's** budget for the next year aims to continue protecting frontline services and promoting growth - despite further cuts of £36m over the next three years.

While still facing continued reduction in funding from central government, the savings needed to be made by the council have reduced by £10m up to 2020 - due to a combination of increased income from council tax receipts linked to economic growth and housing development and increased income from third party loans.

However the challenging cuts mean the council is continuing to undergo a major transformation in the way it operates and delivers services.

In some instances this has resulted in some changes to our services to ensure they can continue rather than being stopped completely; such as the relocation of some libraries into leisure centres and the development of onestop shops of council services.

The council has also continued its commitment to investing in the county through its £381m capital programme over the next year.

The programme includes proposed investment in new schools and leisure centres, infrastructure improvements, increased parking provision and development of the Ashington, Blyth and Tyne Line.

Work is now also underway on the council's new headquarters site in Ashington. By investing in a smaller, more cost-efficient building, the

The council has continued its

refurbishments and operating costs, as well as generating significant income from the land sale in Morpeth – saving taxpayers around £16million over 25 years.

In terms of savings, councillors agreed to cuts of £6m in 2017-18 and a total of £36m up to 2020.

Council Leader Grant Davev said: "Each vear the setting of our budget becomes more challenging as our funding settlement from central government cuts ever deeper.

"However we are living in different times now and need to think differently - we are doing all we can to maintain vital frontline services: investing in town centres, generating jobs in the county, improving education and providing affordable housing.

"There are a number of exciting developments planned across Northumberland as we continue to find innovative ways of doing business. generating sound returns for all residents as well as the council and making a great county even better."

Why not vote by post?

Residents in Northumberland are being encouraged to make voting in this year's county and parish elections easier by voting by post.

Why not try voting from the comfort of your own home and save yourself a trip to the polling station this year? Postal voters will get their ballot papers delivered to them a couple of weeks before election day. All they need to do is complete this ballot pack and post it back in the freepost envelope provided.

If you are registered to vote in the elections you will shortly be receiving a polling card through the door. This will tell you whether you already have a postal vote in place, or which polling station you must visit to cast your vote.

If you are not already a postal voter and would like to give it a try, you will need to contact the council's electoral service team to request an application.



If contacting them by email, please make sure you give the full names and address of anyone wanting an application. Completed applications must be returned by Tuesday 18 April at 5pm.


If you have not received your polling card by 31 March this may mean you are not on the electoral register. To check if you are registered to vote, please contact Northumberland County Council's elections service. **The deadline to register is Thursday April 13**.

If you have only very recently registered to vote and received a confirmation letter from Northumberland County Council, you will receive a polling card at a later date. There is no need to re-register.

Your community - Your say

Councillors are there to represent your views and opinions and are a voice for your community. They make decisions which will affect your every-day life and they decide how large sums of money are spent. It is therefore important that local residents use their vote to choose the candidate that they think will best represent their interests and those of their community.





Exciting plans to transform the site of the old Druridge Bay Middle School into a community park have taken a major step forward.

Landscape architects have drafted up a proposal for the park incorporating many of the ideas put forward by the local community.

The community scheme will amalgamate the current play park in Hadston with the old school site to create a large community space which will incorporate new and refurbished equipment for locals to use.

Proposals include an expanded young children's play area, skateboard facilities, wildlife habitats and tree planting, walking routes, seats and car parking. It is intended that the existing Multi Use Games Area, BMX track and football pitches will be retained.

Local ward member Councillor Scott Dickinson has driven the scheme forward after listening

to the views of local people. He said: "It's great that we are now at the stage that we can really progress this scheme.

"We talked to the local community eighteen months ago about the park and we've listened very carefully to what they told us when drafting up the park plans.

"It is really important to us that the young people have their voices heard and we've incorporated many of their wishes and ideas into the scheme."

The drawings and plans for the scheme will be put before the local community to get their final approval before work starts later this spring.

Doors to open on Druridge Bay **Fitness Centre**

The Druridge Bay Community Centre has recently had a two storey extension added to it

transforming the venue into a modern, multipurpose facility, complete with a gym and a boxing centre.



The first floor of the extension houses a community gym, equipped with state-of-the-art fitness equipment, shower and changing facilities while the ground floor is dedicated to the town's thriving boxing club. The extension has been named The Druridge Bay Fitness Centre.

The adjoining community centre has also been refreshed and refurbished and will continue to be used as a multi-purpose community space, which will include fitness classes in the hall.

Northumberland County Councillor Scott Dickinson said: "This has always been a wellloved community centre but it has now been extended, refurbished and modernised to create a multi-purpose sport and social facility.

"We've had many conversations with the local community throughout the scheme where residents made their preferences clear and the work has taken place in two phases.

"The centre has been refreshed both inside and out and will offer a more comprehensive range of activities and classes. I am sure it will be a real focal point for the local community and a space that all residents can use and enjoy."

Funding for the £550,000 scheme was provided by Northumberland County Council.

New bungalows bring back memories for tenants

A £2.8m council funded development to build 26 new affordable bungalows in Blyth is now complete.

And for one new tenant, 70-year-old Rita Railton, the development built on the former Morpeth Road school, has brought back memories of her time there as a pupil.

She said: "It's like I've come full circle. I grew up just down the road and my first school was on this very spot. In fact the old school railings have been preserved and are now bordering my back garden, which brought back even more memories."

The scheme is part of the council's Affordable Homes programme, which has seen more than 300 homes built across the county in the last three years. It is made up of two-bedroom bungalows, two of which are wheelchair accessible.



Traders welcome street improvement works

A major scheme to improve and re-open Ashington's main shopping street to traffic is proving a hit with traders.

£1.5 million was spent on the town's Station Road to boost local trade, improve the look of the street and help deliver wider economic benefits as part of the ongoing regeneration of the town centre.

Now open to traffic, there are 30 on-street parking bays including six disabled parking spaces.

And since the scheme was completed last December local businesses and town leaders have noticed an upturn in trade.

Al Vaziri, who owns Al's Greeting Cards in the town centre, said: "Since the opening of the street in early December there has been a huge increase in footfall, a lot more people can now shop local and nip into shops where they could never have done before."

The Portland Pub on Station Road is also expanding and adding 12 en-suite bedrooms

to cater for the increased number of visitors to the town. It is planned to be ready for March 2017.

Michael Sproat, Director of The Portland, said: "Ashington is expanding and with all of the new developments and new businesses we felt the time was right to expand our business in parallel and we are now in a position to offer 12 hotel rooms alongside our restaurant and wedding venue."

Sir John Hall, Chair of Ashington Town Team, added: "Quietly over the past few years, Ashington has been changing its image and at last everyone involved in the town is looking at the future and is very excited about what's taking place.

"I would like to praise the County Council and Arch for starting the regeneration of Ashington and now feel it's time for everyone in the town to feel this positive change and support the town's future."

Play boost for Dr Pit Park

Work has started on a £110,000 project that will help to improve and regenerate Dr Pit Park in Bedlington.



The project will see improvements to play equipment, a new MUGA (multi use games area) paths and the planting of trees and shrubs.

Extra parking for Cramlington and Ashington

Cramlington and Ashington are among four Northumberland towns earmarked for new multi-storey car parks to make shopping and business even easier for the growing numbers of locals and visitors.

While the exact locations and costs of the parking facilities are being explored, the projects form part of the council's 2017/18 budget.

Council Leader Grant Davey said: "Our investment in our market towns is about

regeneration, making sure all of them thrive both now and into the future.

"The administration's work means more people will live, work and visit all our towns so car journeys will continue to rise. It's important we look now at our future needs and address them."

Bedlington Sporting Club *opening soon*





Sporting facilities within the new Bedlington High School on Palace Road will soon be opening to the public during evenings, weekends and school holidays.

The facilities will be run by Active Northumberland and open for community use.

They include:

- a gym with 27 stations
- · a studio for health and fitness classes
- a multi-functional hall with four badminton courts (suitable for other activities including basketball, netball and 5-a-side football)





Portland Park is a vibrant, modern and spacious development in the North-East quarter of Ashington, Northumberland.

Arch is leading the ten-year regeneration plan on the 4 ha mixed-use site. The project features leisure facilities, office accommodation, retail space and attractive streets and courtyards in the centre of Ashington.

Portland Park includes the development of Northumberland County Council's new

£32m Headquarters. Arch, has appointed construction company Galliford Try Building Limited, to take forward the redevelopment of Ashington town centre. In total, over £80m is being invested into Portland Park, bringing over 2,000 jobs into Ashington.


Investing in Bedlington's old Tesco site

A public consultation was held in December 2016 for residents in Bedlington to view the proposed £10m development plans for the old Tesco site in Bedlington Town Centre.

The plans include a retail-led mixed use development including:

- A supermarket
- · Retail/commercial units with residential properties or offices above
- · A family pub/restaurant
- New and replacement customer car parking
- Pedestrian routes and other landscaping

Arch appointed Ryder Architects to design the development after a public design competition in 2016. This year, Arch aims to achieve planning permission and secure retail interest with work on site starting late 2017. The development will likely be built in a number of phases over a three-year period.

Change4Life launches new Be Food Smart campaign

A new campaign that highlights the surprising amount of sugar, saturated fat and salt found in everyday food and drink has been launched to encourage parents to 'Be Food Smart' and take control of their children's diet.



Without realising it, we are all eating too much sugar, saturated fat and salt. Over time this can lead to harmful changes on the inside and increases the risk of serious diseases in the future. Childhood obesity is a growing issue with figures showing that in England, more than 1 in 4 children aged 4 to 5 yearsold and more than 1 in 3 children aged 10 and 11 years-old are overweight or obese.

The Be Food Smart campaign empowers families to take control of their diet by making healthier food and drink choices. The free app works by scanning the barcode of products, revealing the total sugar, saturated fat and salt inside and providing hints and tips for adults and fun food detective activities for kids.

The campaign also includes distribution of 4.6 million free Be Food Smart packs to primary aged children and their families at local events across England.

Help us to help you this winter

With the cold weather upon us, here is some advice on how to look after yourself well.

Practise good self-care – keep a well-stocked medicines cabinet at home and treat a large range of common winter conditions without needing to use the NHS.

Ask a pharmacist – they're highly-trained health experts on everything from colds to long-term conditions.

Contact your GP – many GPs can offer advice over the phone and can arrange referral to a hospital specialist if you need it.

Call NHS 111 – if you need medical help fast, but it's not life threatening or you're not sure where to go, a 111 advisor will assess you and direct you to the best-placed service in your area. NHS 111 is available 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. Calls are free from landlines and mobile phones.

If it's urgent – use your local urgent care centres at Wansbeck, Hexham and North Tyneside general hospitals if you have an urgent problem but it's not life threatening.

No Smoking Day 2017

Smokers in Northumberland are being urged to take the first step in giving up cigarettes for good on No Smoking Day which takes place on Wednesday 8 March.

The annual campaign is supported by the British Heart Foundation (BHF) and each year thousands of smokers choose No Smoking Day as the day they start to stop – proudly turning their backs on a life with cigarettes.

Northumberland County Council and Northumbria Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust will be active on No Smoking Day to help smokers make this the day they start to stop.

The Stop Smoking Service, which is provided by Northumbria Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust, now has over 100 advisors offering support across the county.

People accessing the service can expect to benefit from free expert NHS advice and a personalised quit plan, as well as range of evidence-based treatments to help beat cravings.



TOP TIPS TO STOPPING SMOKING

Stopping smoking isn't easy, but there are things you can do to improve your chances of success.

- Pick a quit date choose a day that will be stress-free, and stick to it.
- Make a list of all the reasons you want to quit. Keep the list and read it if you get any cravings.
- Pair up with someone else who's looking to give up smoking and support each other.
- Contact your local NHS Stop Smoking Service for support from trained specialists.

We've adopted Motor Neurone charter

Northumberland County Council has become the first council in the north to adopt the Motor Neurone Disease Charter (MND).

The council is a key service provider for people with MND and its adoption of the Charter signals a clear commitment to transform lives, by working with other organisations to support those who are living with the disease and their carers.

MND is a fatal, rapidly progressing disease which affects the brain and spinal cord. It affects up to 5,000 adults in the UK at any one time, and six people die every day from the disease.

Councillors have an important role to play in helping to shape the services which people

with MND rely on, such as social care, housing, health care, and public transport, as well as supporting the Champion the Charter campaign.

The five-point Charter was launched to improve people's understanding of the disease as well as the care and support on offer, by coordinating efforts and improving local standards of care.

Residents are being asked to have their say on the plans for the state of the art complexes in the three market towns, and will be able to give their views on what facilities should be included at the new leisure centres.

In December 2016, Northumberland County Council announced plans to build a new leisure centre and community hub in Morpeth, complete with library, restaurant and hotel. The leisure centre, to be built on the proposed site at Gas House Lane, will also incorporate a customer service centre and potentially a performance venue. The modern complex will allow customers to benefit from longer opening hours and access to a range of other services all under one roof. Plans for the proposed redevelopment are currently being drawn up and are scheduled for consultation in March 2017.

Later in December 2016, it was announced that two much-needed multi-million pound leisure centres would be built at Berwick and Blyth as part of the council's Market Towns Initiative. The current leisure centres do not meet modern expectations and will be replaced with two 21st century, state of the art leisure and cultural facilities. At this early stage, residents will be asked for their views on the plans and consultation dates will be announced soon.

Leader of Northumberland County Council, Councillor Grant Davey, said:

It's great news for residents
living in Morpeth, Berwick and
Blyth that they will finally get the
21st century leisure and cultural
facilities that they deserve. These
important council investments will
make a tremendous difference to
people's lives and will allow them to
access far better facilities than are
currently available.

All the new leisure centres will be built to high environmental standards with lower running costs.

Other investments:

In Ponteland the gym has been revamped and the town's new library has opened inside the leisure centre where it will stay until the new multi-million pound landmark project to create a combined schools and leisure campus is completed in 2019.

In Ashington, Northumberland County Council invested £20 million into a brand new leisure centre with Sport England contributing a further £1 million of funding.

Cramlington's Concordia Leisure Centre underwent a multi-million pound upgrade which included the modernisation of the gym, and the provision of a new Clip 'n Climb activity, soft play facilities and a tenpin bowling alley.

Prudhoe Waterworld underwent a major £650,000 revamp with a refurbished gym and fitness studio, and the installation of new state-of-the-art technogym fitness equipment.

Newbiggin Leisure Centre has had investment to upgrade heating, toilet and changing facilities

There have also been a variety of smaller projects in centres across the county, including new state of the art gym equipment, with further investment planned for 2017.

Active Northumberland, manages all leisure and cultural services on behalf of Northumberland County Council, including fitness and sports centres, community sites and beach facilities.
