Winter services

Making grittin' great again

As the county heads into winter, the council's cutting-edge fleet of salt spreaders are back on the region's roads.

Last year the authority bought seven new state-of-the-art gritters to increase its fleet which cover thousands of miles each year. Costing more than $\pounds100,000$ each, the hi-tech machines help ensure the county stays open for business, whatever the weather.

This year the process has become even more streamlined, thanks to technology developments over the past 12 months.

During last winter the council thermally mapped and updated all the current primary gritting routes within Northumberland.

This was carried out using differing extremes of conditions. Over the summer months the highly detailed information has been extracted and a completely new thermal map of the primary gritting routes has been produced. This will help staff determine which routes will need to be treated and when, taking into account detailed weather forecast and actual weather station data to further strengthen the accuracy of the decision making process.

Michael Carle (pictured), the council's operational lead on delivery of winter services, said: "With thousands of miles of roads in the county, our workforce is always well prepared to meet the challenges of winter weather.

"The geography of the county presents unique challenges where it can be snowing over the tops but bright sunshine at the coast.

"Thankfully we have access to some state-ofthe-art equipment which is developing every year so we can establish exactly where needs gritting and at what level.

"And these days all the gritters are fitted with tracking devices to ensure their location is known at all times – providing an extra level of safety especially for those working in more rural areas."

- * 28 multi-purpose gritting vehicles
- Two purpose-built snow blowers and five gully tankers
- **1,600** grit bins and **200** grit heaps

Christmas TREE Recycling

Real Christmas trees can be recycled into good quality compost or soil conditioner, or into chippings. You can take them to your local household waste recovery centre during normal site opening times, where they are collected and recycled along with other items of garden waste.

After Christmas, to make it easier to recycle your tree, we have arranged over 30 additional collection points across the county where you can take your tree to be collected and recycled.

The cons of **Christmas**

Christmas is, unfortunately, an ideal time for rogue traders to fleece the public. They not only cheat those who can ill afford it, they also sometimes put people in danger from faulty or badly-designed products.

Northumberland County Council's Trading Standards Team gives advice for a safe and scam free Christmas.

DANGEROUS TOYS - Always buy toys from trustworthy shops and online outlets - roque traders may deal in cheap, counterfeit or unsafe toys that do not meet the required safety standards.

DOORSTEP CRIME - Roque traders will try to convince residents that unnecessary, and often sub-standard, home improvement work is needed and often at extortionate prices. Always use reputable and trustworthy local traders. or those recommended by family and friends.

FACEBOOK ADVERTS - Be wary of buying goods from sites such as Facebook when branded clothes, bags, makeup and perfumes are on offer at low prices. The goods are often counterfeit and some may not meet safety standards.

FAKE TOBACCO AND ALCOHOL - The sale of counterfeit and often dangerous alcohol and tobacco become more prevalent in the run up to Christmas.



SHADY CHARITIES - While Christmas is the time for giving, always double-check who you are giving money to and what you're signing if asked to make donations by direct debit. Official collectors will have ID badges and be registered with the council's licensing section.

BANK SCAMS - Beware of emails, phone calls or texts purporting to be from your bank or HMRC asking you to disclose personal or financial details for a rebate. Any reputable source will never ask for your bank details over the phone or online.

LOAN SHARKS - Christmas can put a strain on any budget. Always steer clear of illegal money lenders who charge interest at 100% or even 1,000%.

ONLINE FREE TRIALS - New Year resolutions often involve losing weight. Scammers know this and have created on-line pop-ups offering free trials on items like weight loss supplements while disguising contracts in amongst the fine print. After entering your card details scammers use these hidden contracts to regularly take sums of money from the victim's account.

SALES BUT NO BARGAINS - Winter sales may seem to offer a bargain but in fact are no cheaper than ordinary prices. Make sure that you want the item at that price and are not being rushed into making a purchase you might regret later.

Leader welcomes historic deal

"We have been working with Government since the beginning of the year to agree a deal that builds on our strong track record of creating jobs and nurturing world-leading businesses.

Be a savvy online shopper

If you don't want your hard-earned cash to end up in the pocket of some scamster, follow these online safety tips.

- Make sure the website is genuine. Some scammers are very good at designing websites to look like well-known brands and can fool the unwary. The best way to make sure you are shopping on the genuine website is to type in the address yourself rather than clicking on a link.
- Look for a contact number and office address on the site.
- The latest versions of web browsers help block spoof websites. Install the latest antivirus and firewall software on all your computers and switch on the 'automatic updates' setting so your protection is kept up-to-date.
- At the online check-out, before you type in your credit card details make sure the web address bar has switched from 'http:' to 'https:' to indicate a secure, encrypted connection. Any legitimate online site processing payments always switches to a secure connection at this stage.

Work progresses on key sites

With the council's decision to remain in the current County Hall rather than relocate to Ashington, development work is continuing in both towns with residents at the centre of the plans.

At the Portland Park site in Ashington, there were two public consultation sessions and an online survey for the public to have their say on what facilities they would like in the town centre.

The ideas and views will inform a new masterplan for the town, and will be shared again with the public in the near future.

Meanwhile changes are being made to the road layout as part of the infrastructure to create new development sites, alleviate congestion in the town centre and help pedestrian movement. In Morpeth residents have also been given the opportunity to share their views on how the town develops over the next few years.

People were asked for their ideas for future redevelopment – including key sites like County Hall, the former library site and the leisure centre.

The ideas will go towards the creation of a supplementary planning document which will sit alongside the town's Neighbourhood Plan and help developers understand how we want the Morpeth of the future to look.

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Event Tour of Britain

Tour of Britain boosted Northumberland's economy by almost £4m

The Tour of Britain cycle race which blazed through Northumberland in September has boosted the county's economy by almost £4 million, an independent report has revealed.

The world class cycling event saw an estimated 100,000 people lining the county's roadsides with many flocking in from around the region to cheer on the top sporting stars, including UK favourite Mark Cavendish.

Stage two of the Tour, set off from Kielder and finished in Blyth passing through 28 communities and covering over 200 kms. Many shops, cafes, bars, hotels and restaurants along the route reported brisk business on the day.

Leader of Northumberland County Council, Peter Jackson said: "The financial boost to local businesses from the Tour was quite remarkable. For every pound invested, we saw over 10 times the return in the local economy and it was great to see the event so well supported within the county."

"Not only did our County Council provide the main financial support to hold this stage of the race in Northumberland but our staff throughout the county did a brilliant job to make sure that the arrangements went so well."

The race featured 20 teams, with 120 riders from 24 different countries taking part.

The event provided a huge opportunity to shine the international spotlight on the beauty of the county. International broadcasts of the race reached more than 150 countries including North America, Asia and Sub-Saharan Africa and reached 12 million viewers across Europe including the cycling powerhouse countries of France, Italy and Belgium.

Go on sign up, join us and get ready to go dry

After the excess of Christmas why not start the New Year with a clear head by signing up to the Dry January challenge, either on your own or as a group, to give up drinking for a month.

Last year people told us they enjoyed the challenge; some people lost weight, some slept better, almost everyone saved cash and many said they naturally reduced their drinking for the rest of the year. Alcohol is linked to more than 60 medical conditions and diseases including liver disease, various cancers, stomach ulcers, raised blood pressure, stroke and dementia. It is also important to remember that most people who suffer alcohol-related health problems are not alcoholics or binge drinkers. They are people who have been drinking at or above the recommended daily limits for a number of years.

Don't put off the flu vaccination - it's free because you need it

People at most risk from flu are being urged to make sure they get vaccinated against the virus.

Pregnant women, people aged 65 years or over and children and adults with long term health conditions are known to be at risk. Flu also affects those with weakened immune systems such as neurological disorders, liver, lung or renal disease, heart problems or diabetes.

A nasal spray vaccine is being offered to children aged 2-8 years old in a bid to slow down the spread of the virus. Young children's close contact with each other means they are more likely to transmit the virus to other more vulnerable groups, including older people.

But there a number of things we can all do to help prepare for the cold weather and ward off common winter illnesses:

- Catch coughs or sneezes in a tissue and then bin the used tissues as soon as possible. Wash your hands regularly to prevent the spread of infection.
- Get the flu vaccination. Those over 65, pregnant women, children aged 2-4 and in school years 1 and 2 and people with long-term health conditions can receive this free from their GP or pharmacist. Carers can also get the vaccine free.
- At the first sign of illness, seek immediate advice and help from your pharmacist.
- Keep warm, both indoors and outdoors. This will help prevent colds, flu and more serious health problems.
- Pick up any prescription medicines before your GP or pharmacy closes for Christmas and keep stocked up with medication such as paracetamol or ibuprofen so you can deal with common winter illnesses.
- Stock up well on winter food supplies.
- Keep an eye on elderly or frail friends, neighbours and relatives.

Residents encouraged to take plunge for a fitter life

Residents in Northumberland are being encouraged to jump in and test the water at their local swimming pool following a major investment of £230,000 by Sport England.

Active Northumberland has been awarded the funding to encourage people to swim more often and help address the drop off in adult swimming.

Four Active Northumberland centres – Ashington, Blyth, Hexham and Ponteland – have been selected to pilot the new Take The Plunge scheme.

A survey has been carried out to give a better understanding of customers needs and expectations at their local pool. The investment



will now be used to further improve the customer experience for swimmers including improved changing rooms and poolside areas, the introduction of new and innovative classes, additional swimming support as well as new marketing initiatives and incentive campaigns to encourage people to give their local pool a try.

Active Northumberland has also appointed Mark Seymour as the new Head of Swimming to help deliver the project.

Hundreds of Northumberland residents will make quitting smoking their New Year's resolution and there's loads of free support and advice available to help you succeed.

Commissioned by the county council, Northumberland NHS Stop Smoking Service run clinics in a range of venues including GP practices, pharmacies and community centres. Some out-of-hours clinics are also available for those who find it difficult to attend appointments during the day.

Northumbria Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust public health nurse lead Gillian Emmerson said: "We know you are four times more likely to stop smoking if you get support from an NHS stop smoking advisor. We offer free support and advice to smokers and e-cigarette users. People accessing the service can expect to benefit from free expert NHS advice and a personalised quit plan, as well as prescription treatments to help beat cravings."

"Dorothy and I have been volunteering for over 20 years as a team, visiting and delivering monthly to both housebound people and to some residential homes. We have both been involved in several aspects of volunteering for some years, but it is a real privilege to go into people's homes and spend time with them as they select their reading material. Volunteering has always been a pleasure for me, as through giving my time, I receive so much back."

Hexham library refurbishment almost complete



Work to refurbish the library area in Hexham's historic Queen's Hall is almost complete.

The space is being renovated to create a fantastic new facility that will provide a modern and accessible integrated library, customer services and visitor information centre - all under one roof.

Northumberland County Council is investing £500,000 in the project which will breathe new life into the library area which has been designed taking customer needs into account.

The library and visitor information services are temporarily housed in the old tourist information building at Wentworth Car Park but will relocate back into the Queen's Hall early in the New Year.



Big to bridge the funding gap

Final preparations are underway on a funding bid to try and safeguard the future of a historic bridge spanning England and Scotland.

The Union Chain Bridge near Berwick is the oldest operational suspension bridge in the world still carrying vehicles, and through securing Heritage Lottery funding it is hoped the bridge can also deliver numerous cultural, heritage and community benefits as part of ambitious plans to safeguard its future.

Scottish Borders Council, Northumberland County Council and community group Friends of the Union Chain Bridge are jointly working on a £7.3m project to secure its status, including the submission of a bid for funding from the Heritage Lottery, ahead of its 200th anniversary in 2020.

Both councils have committed £1m each to the Union Chain Bridge project and further work is being planned to secure financial support and grant funding from a range of other stakeholders, including conservation bodies, charities, trusts and professional institutions.

With the dark evenings now upon us, the number of fly-tipping incidents taking place in the county are expected to rise.

We can all play a part when it comes to fighting fly tipping. Here's how.

1: Don't make the mistake of employing rogue traders to remove your waste

- Many of the culprits who have been caught and prosecuted for fly tipping are rogue waste carriers who charge residents to collect their bulky household waste, but then dump it unlawfully.
- If you are using an independent waste carrier you should always ask to see the operator's waste carrier licence, issued by the Environment Agency.
- This is really important because, if you make the mistake of employing an unlicensed waste carrier and they dump your waste illegally you could also be fined along with them.

2: Be vigilant and report any fly-tipping sightings immediately

Free dog waste bag dispensers to stop foul play

The latest weapon in the war on dog fouling has been unleashed by Northumberland County Council.

Dog owners no longer have an excuse of falling foul of the law when it comes to picking up after their four-legged friends after the installation of free dog waste bag dispensers at two dog fouling hot spots.

The dispensers hold 100 percent compostable and biodegradable dog waste bags which are free and accessible 24/7.

They have been installed at Milburn Park bowling green, Newbiggin and at the entrance to Tyne Green in Hexham on a two month trial basis. If they prove successful there are plans to introduce more dog waste stations across the county.

The stations have been provided free of charge by international market-leading company, TiksPac, who will cover their cost through advertising.

Tackling wildfire training with virtual reality

Northumberland firefighters invited partners from across Europe to step into a virtual reality world to improve their responses to wildfires.

The international training event was hosted by Northumberland Fire and Rescue Service and was the first of its kind in the UK.

The training involved the use of a simulation tool consisting of a network of computers running advanced gaming-style software presenting those attending with a realistic virtual fire.

Commanders were required to use their skills and experience to make informed decisions on how to safely and effectively manage the incident and put out the large-scale and complex wildfire.

The training scenarios included changes in the rate and direction of the spread of the fire and some challenging elements such as nearby local communities and infrastructure.
