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PARTICIPATION

Participation is the process by which individuals and aroups of individuals can influence decision making and bring about change. Participation literally means 'taking part'. The term is now used to describe many different relationships and degrees of participative activity. For children and young people this can range from them aiving opinions on a particular issue. (consulted and informed) to choosing their own agenda and taking their own decisions, (child initiated and directed).

TAKING ACCOUNT OF CHILDREN'S VIEWS

The Ofsted and the HMIP Inspection Framework's emphasise the importance of taking account of children's views. At present not all services demonstrate how feedback from individual children about their service is collated to inform service development.

IN DECISION MAKING

Services need to be able to demonstrate that children and young people have been involved in decision making, and that services have changed as a result of that involvement. The aim is not to be prescriptive so that everyone is doing the same but rather to reach a position whereby it is the norm for children and young people to be engaged in and able to influence the planning, commissioning and evaluation of children's services in Northumberland.

FEEDBACK

Feedback, in terms of what action has or has not been taken, to children and young people who have been involved is a vital element of the participation process and should be undertaken.



...we need to develop a clear framework which addresses at what stage we gather views, how these views are obtained and what we do with this information. The table that follows begins to look at this. It's important that we recognise the role vulnerable children and young people can play in shaping service delivery and development. This plan sets out our commitment and approach to involve them in all areas of decision making and taking their views seriously. Strong participation of vulnerable people is a hallmark of 'bringing communities together'.

The **Participation of Vulnerable Children and Young People Plan** will enhance delivery of Northumberland's strategic priorities by identifying children and young people's views to influence corporate and partnership priorities. This plan sets out proposals to not only seek the views of children and young people, but also to engage with them and support their participation in the implementation of key priorities and activities.

What is participation and why is it important?

The Participation of Vulnerable Children and Young

People Plan aims to enable children and young people to have a voice to inform decisions and to participate in the delivery of those decisions.

(UNICEF: Rights of the child and a quote from a young person's perspective)

Young people must be in the driving seat to inform decisions, shape provision, and inspect quality. Young people matter. They are important to us now and to our future and we need them to flourish. A very small minority of young people feel no sense of belonging and as a result do not respect the communities in which they live. The vast majority, however, do make a positive contribution and feel misrepresented and undermined by negative images of, and attitudes towards, young people. We need to work together to create a society that is more positive for youth'. (Positive for Youth, 2012).

Participation strategy priority

We will ensure the voices of our most vulnerable children and young people are heard, giving them the influence to directly affect the way we develop and deliver the services that support them.

Participation is important as it gives the young people ownership and responsibility over the services that are there for them (Young person, Northumberland).

Our vision

That all vulnerable children and young people across Northumberland can have their views heard to influence decision making at all levels.

For affective participation we need to:

- Know the value and contribution that vulnerable children and young people make within communities throughout Northumberland
- Make sure resources are available to encourage and facilitate high quality participation opportunities to vulnerable children and young people
- Increase the opportunities available for vulnerable children and young people to effectively influence strategic and political decisions if they want to

To ensure:

- Our priorities reflect vulnerable children and young people's needs, hopes and views
- Increase the skills, competencies and confidence of vulnerable children and young people to develop and deliver their own participation activities
- Improve children and young people's leadership capabilities
- Influence cultural and strategic change and commitment amongst all partners
- Increase opportunities for vulnerable young people's
 employment and on-going progression
- Influence and embed vulnerable children and young people's participation within commissioning processes at all levels
- We will provide easily accessible information so that all vulnerable children and young people can make informed decisions
- We will safeguard all vulnerable children and young people when involved in a participation activity
