Using external visitors to support on-line safety education

Northumberland's <u>Multi-agency Safeguarding Hub (MASH)</u> is now being implemented. The MASH is based at Foundry House in Bedlington, next to the SPA (single point of access) and will deal with safeguarding referrals for children and adults. <u>Choke Out: warning from A&E Departments:</u> It has come to our attention that children are playing a game called 'choke out'. The object of the game is to put a person in a head lock and strangle/choke them until they ask you to stop or pass out, the one who lasts the longest wins. Consequently:

- children have blacked out and have had a seizure as a result of lack of oxygen
- they have had marks around the neck area where they have been strangled/choked
- this could've potentially resulted in brain damage or loss of life.

Please be vigilant and raise awareness with all school staff, including those who supervise children at break and lunch times.

Training Opportunity: Child Sexual Exploitation and Domestic Abuse

You will also be able to book dates and arrange for the partnership team to come out to your school/organisation and deliver further teacher training on the Strengthening Relationships lessons.

Serious Case Reviews

It is important that schools use the learning from serious case reviews as part of their safeguarding updates, and that the learning is revisited regularly to ensure it is embedded in practice.

Key learning from 'Molly' published on 10th September 2017

All agencies should review their participation and engagement in strategy meetings to ensure:

- decisions about single/joint agency investigations are made following consultation with Social Care;
- there are effective systems to ensure that there is full and comprehensive sharing of information.

Schools are key partners in this process and should ensure their attendance at meetings (as stated in Keeping Children Safe in Education 2016) and Face to Face multi agency strategy meetings should always be held in cases of suspected child sexual abuse and recorded as such

Key learning from Kirsty published 27/9/17

- Focus was on mother therefore father was overlooked in assessments so always ensure the involvement of all partners is reflected in any assessment;
- 'Think child' when dealing with adult issues;
- do not allow gender bias in domestic abuse both males and females can be perpetrators;
- ensure chronologies are maintained and all notes are up to date and are a true representation of meetings;
- do not assume someone else has made a referral when there are concerns or that a parent will self refer if you are worried, follow your procedures, discuss with your DSL and make a referral.

Learn CPR and save a life

British Heart Foundation 'Call Push Rescue' CPR resources includes lesson plans and materials for schools to accompany a DVD and online video resources and was launched to coincide with **European Restart a Heart Day**. Together with the Call Push Rescue training equipment, these resources provide everything needed to learn the important life-saving skill of cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR).

The lesson pack is designed for delivery from Key Stage 3 upwards and can be used with the 'Call Push Rescue' training equipment, which is also free to eligible secondary schools. Alongside guidance on promoting best practice PSHE education delivery, lesson plans and resources are provided to accommodate either one or two sessions designed to ensure young people are trained in this life-saving skill.

PSHE education is the ideal context for learning first aid and CPR as it provides opportunities to develop practical knowledge alongside the skills and attributes necessary to put such knowledge into practice in a real life emergency – for example through development of self-confidence and empathy, and learning to identify and manage risk.

If your school does not have a CPR kit, please check to see if you are eligible.

Free kits are only available to eligible UK secondary schools teaching children in Year 9 and above. Middle schools are not eligible:

Run, Hide, Tell

You've probably seen the recent 'Run, Hide, Tell' media campaign advising you on what to do in the event of a knife or gun terror attack.

Your school might be tempted to cover this – for example through assemblies or taught lessons – but we **strongly advise** that you wait until KS 3 and 4 lesson plans are published by the PSHE Association on the topic.

This campaign is aimed at pupils aged 11-16, and we urge against covering it in schools with younger children. These quality assured PSHE lesson plans and a film for use in the classroom will follow up the recent media campaign, and these materials will help you to approach this difficult topic sensitively and appropriately.

This is a challenging topic to cover in schools, but PSHE can provide opportunity to do so responsibly as it's important to inform your pupils of what to do in the unlikely event of such incidents, rather than shock them into thinking such attacks are likely or inevitable.

The teacher guidance and lesson plans, produced by the PSHE Association will give you everything you need to deliver this learning safely in your school and will be published by NaCTSO via their website in mid to late October.

Inspection of services for children who have experienced neglect

It is still possible that before the end of term our local area will have a joint targeted inspection of services for children who have experienced neglect. A briefing about the possible inspection was distributed to schools in the summer term and again through your DSLs at the recent NSCB Education Reference subgroup.
