### Background:

Working Together 2018 was published on 4<sup>th</sup> July 2018, replacing the 2015 document.

Changes include:

Updating the following sections:

- Chapter 1 on Assessing need and providing help
- Chapter 2 on Organisational responsibilities

Significant revision of the following sections:

- Chapter 3 on Multi-agency safeguarding arrangements
- Chapter 4 on Improving child protection and safeguarding practice
- Chapters 5 on Child death reviews

# Multi Agency Safeguarding Arrangements 02

Under the new legislation, three safeguarding partners (local authorities, chief officers of police, and clinical commissioning groups) must make arrangements to work together with relevant agencies (as they consider appropriate) to safeguard and protect the welfare of children in the area.

Relevant agencies are those organisations whose involvement the safeguarding partners consider is required to safeguard and promote the welfare of local children.

# Organisational Responsibilities:

The guidance includes a new section on "people in positions of trust" highlighting that "organisations and agencies working with children and families should have clear policies for dealing with allegations against people who work with children".

#### **Child Death Reviews:**

The guidance replaces the requirement for LSCBs to ensure that child death reviews are undertaken by a child death overview panel (CDOP) with the requirement for "child death review partners" (consisting of local authorities and any clinical commissioning groups for the local area) to make arrangements to review child deaths.

Information on the rapid review process and criteria, and guidance safeguarding partners must consider is also included



# Assessing need and providing help:

The guidance highlights specifically that practitioners should be alert to the potential need for early help for children in particular circumstances.

The guidance also includes:

1) a new section on referral highlighting that anyone with a concern about a child's welfare should make a referral to local authority children's social care

2) a myth busting guide to information sharing
3) a new section on assessment of disabled children and
their carers; young carers; children in secure youth establishments;
4) a new section on contextual safeguarding.
