



Know Northumberland – A Northumberland Analysis of the English Indices of Deprivation 2015 (IDAOPI – Income Deprivation Affecting Older People Index)

Key Results

- Only 3 LSOAs (2%) in Northumberland are the **most** deprived 10% of all LSOAs in England, and these 3 LSOAs all fall into the South East of Northumberland, in the Croft and Cowpen areas of Blyth.
- 30 LSOAs (12%) in Northumberland fall into the **least** deprived 10% of all LSOAs in England

Introduction

The following profile presents key statistics on Older People in Northumberland and provides an analysis of the Income Deprivation Affecting Older People Index (IDAOPI) from the Indices of Deprivation (ID) 2015. All data in the population section of the profile is from the 2012 ONS mid-year population estimates and is based on people aged 60 and over. The data in the IDAOPI section comes mainly from 2012 sources as this was the latest data available when the ID 2015 was created; any population data used therefore refers to the ONS mid 2012 estimates.

Background to the Indices of Deprivation 2015

The English Indices of Deprivation (ID) 2015 replaces the Indices of Deprivation 2010 as the government's official measure of deprivation in England. It measures relative levels of deprivation in small areas across England called Lower Layer Super Output Areas (LSOAs). There are 197 LSOAs in Northumberland and 32,844 in England. The LSOA ranked 1 in the ID 2015 is the most deprived and that ranked 32,844 is the least deprived. The section below concentrates on the (IDAOPI) one of the two supplementary indices that make up the ID 2010 and measures the proportion of older people aged 60 and over living in income deprived households.

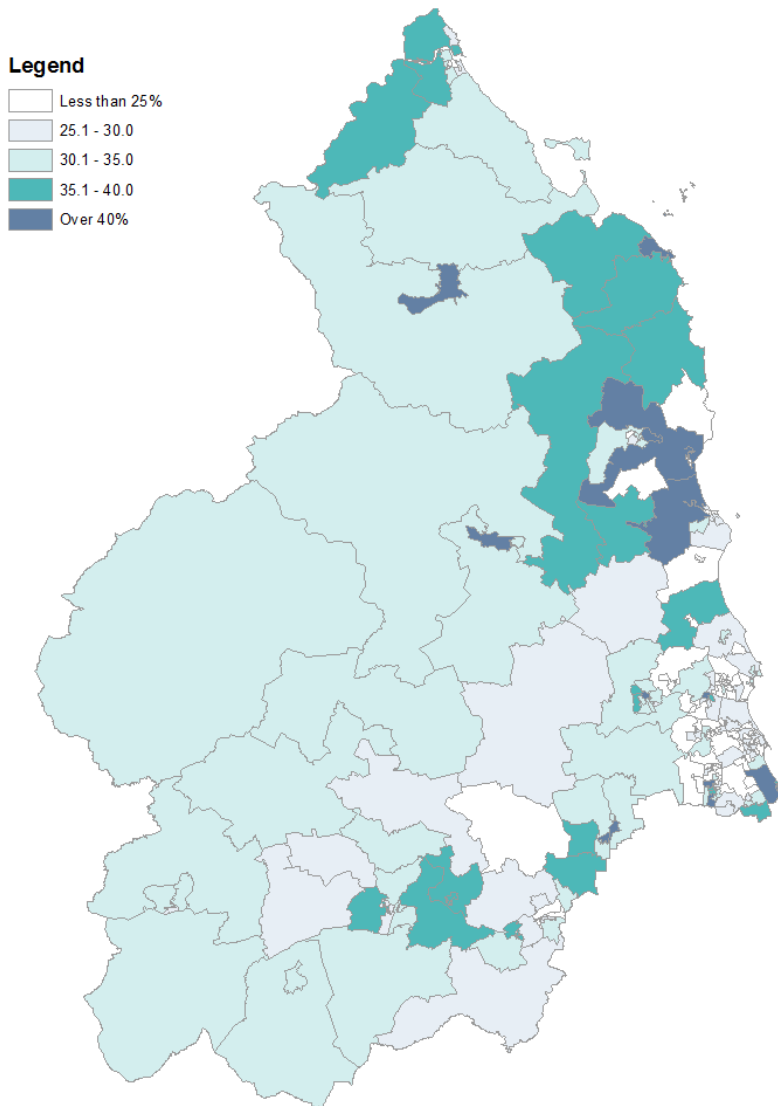
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Population

Population figures are based on the ONS 2012 Mid Year Estimates for Northumberland which were published at an LSOA level.

**Proportion of Older People aged 60 and over by LSOA
(Mid 2012 Pop Estimates)**



- In 2012 there were 90,080 people aged 60 and over living in Northumberland which accounts for 28.5% of the total population of the County. This is higher than the percentage living in the North East (24.2%) and England (22.6%).
- There are more females aged 60+ than males – 48,414 as opposed to 41,666.
- At a local level (LSOA) the percentage of the total population aged 60 and over, ranges from 44.6% in Rothbury and Thropton to 9.4% in the East Hartford / Shankhouse area of Cramlington.
- In general the higher percentages of older people tend to be in rural towns and villages such as Allendale, Rothbury, Seahouses, Amble, Morpeth, Ponteland and Wooler.
- The lowest percentages appear to be in more urban parts – Cramlington, Blyth, Bedlington and Newbiggin, but also some rural areas such as Prudhoe and north of Morpeth.

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Population projections

- Since 2009 the population aged 60 and over has increased by 5.8% from 85,169.
- The population of people aged 60+ is set to increase by 40.7% between 2012 and 2033 to 126,724. This is much higher growth than the total population (2.7%) and a higher rate than across the North East as a whole (38.1%) and England (46.1%).

The map above shows the distribution of the older population in 2012.

Income Deprivation Affecting Older People Index (IDAOP)

- Only 3 LSOAs (2%) in Northumberland are the most deprived 10% of all LSOAs in England, the same number as in the ID 2010.
- 5 LSOAs (2.5%) are in the 11% to 20% most deprived, 2 less than in 2010.
- 22 (11%) fall into the 21% to 30% most deprived, 4 less than in 2010.
- 30 LSOAs (12%) in Northumberland fall into the least deprived 10% of all LSOAs in England, the same as in 2010.
- The 3 LSOAs in the most deprived 10% all fall into the South East of Northumberland, in the Croft and Cowpen areas of Blyth.
- The LSOAs in the most deprived 30% are mainly concentrated in South East Northumberland but there are also areas in the most deprived 30% outside of south east Northumberland, around the main towns of Hexham, Prudhoe, Morpeth, Amble, Alnwick and Berwick-upon-Tweed.
- The LSOAs in rural areas of Northumberland are relatively less deprived according to the IDAOP.

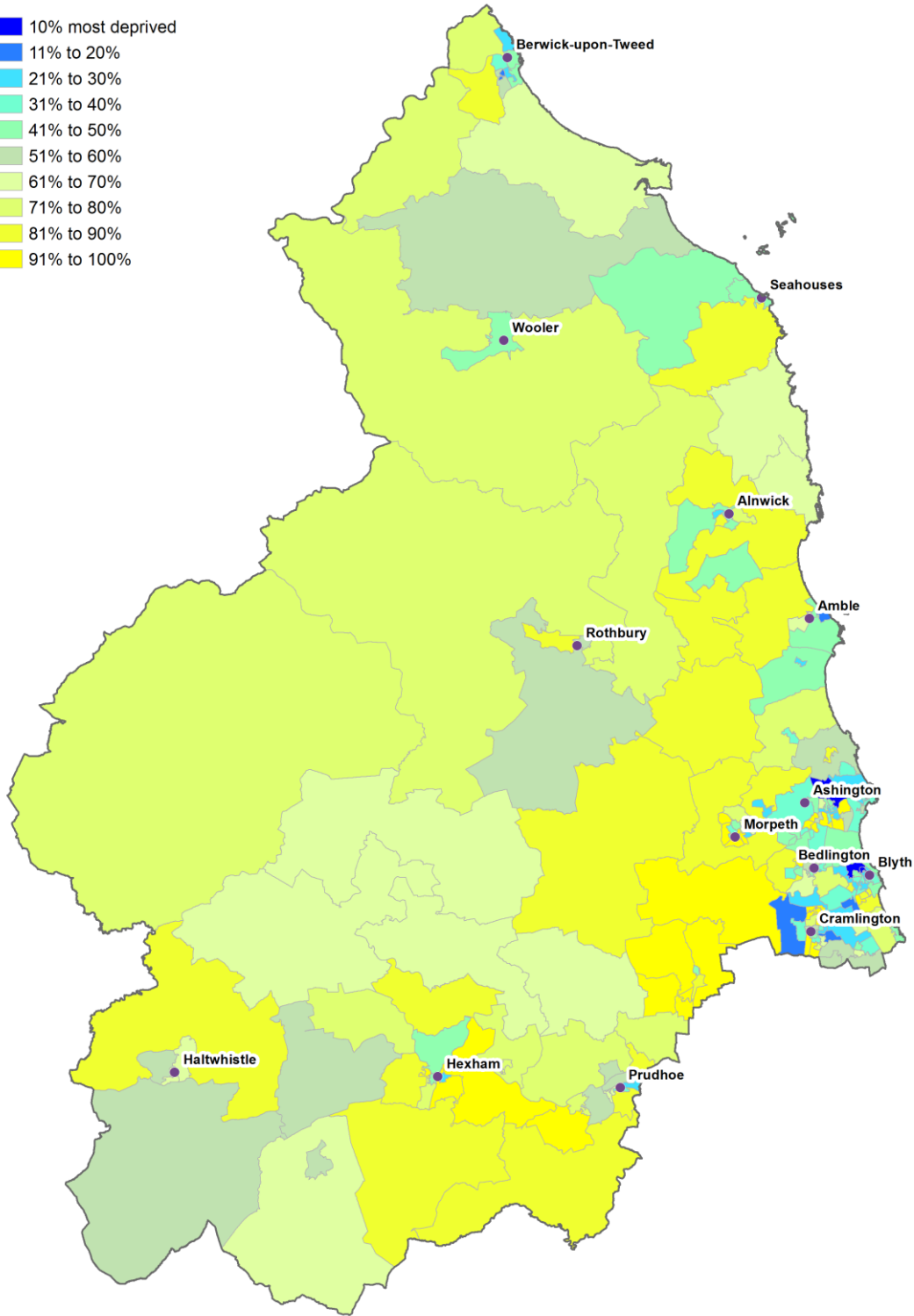
