Proposed 30 MPH Speed Limit Extension at Embleton & Dunstan Steads Cabinet Member: Glen Sanderson – Leader of Council

Purpose of Report

This report sets out the background to the proposed extension of a 30 MPH speed limit in association with new traffic calming measures at Embleton.

Recommendations

It is recommended that the 30 MPH speed limit is introduced at Embleton and extended towards Dunstan Steads.

Key Issues

The proposal has been developed following concerns of high vehicular speeds raised by residents in the area.

The scheme is to be partially funded by the local Ward Member Councillor Pattison through the Members Local Improvement Scheme budget and from the 2020/21 Local Transport Plan (LTP) budget.

Background

The B1339 single carriageway road is the main route through Embleton. It has a derestricted speed limit on the northbound approach to Embleton until it reaches a 30 MPH limit at the entrance where commercial properties and the church are located at the junction with Sunny Brae. This road then leads to an end route at Dunstan Steads, which also operates under a derestricted speed limit and is popular with tourists visiting the coastal area. The only traffic calming features in operation are speed limit entry signs and faded road marking roundels with red surfacing.

In response to concerns raised regarding speeding in the Embleton vicinity, the Parish Council have asked for options to be considered in the form of physical infrastructure to address this and an extension of the 30 MPH speed limit is therefore being proposed, with added traffic calming features.

Traffic calming features at both approaches to Embleton are to be introduced. At Vincent Edwards Church of England First School, this comprises of the provision of advisory 20 MPH speed limit signs which flash during school start and end times to encourage slower speeds at the approach to the school, with warning signs to notify motorists of schoolchildren ahead. It is anticipated that advisory measures will be sufficient through this section of the B1339, where no collisions have been recorded in the last 5 years and speeds are already indicated to be low from recent surveys. The Department for Transport suggests that signed-only 20 MPH speed limit routes are most appropriate for areas where vehicle speeds are already low and that this alone will lead to general compliance using such signage.

At the extended speed limit routes, further repeater signs with the 30 MPH speed limit will be installed to act as a reminder and 'SLOW' road marking text will also be installed to coincide with the new restrictions.




Fig 1 Proposed 30 MPH speed limit extension at Embleton & Dunstan Steads

It is expected that the speed limit reduction measures will promote slower traffic speeds in Embleton where the presence of pedestrians such as schoolchildren is more prominent and at sharp bends on the rural road leading to Dunstan Steads.

Details of the proposals are shown on the plans at Appendix A.

Northumbria Police, other emergency services and relevant statutory consultees will be notified of these amendments as part of the process for making the permanent Orders.
