The Council would never contact a resident in this manner to issue a refund. Please be vigilant and never provide your personal details or bank or credit card details over the phone.

If you are contacted by someone claiming to be from the Council and you are unsure, please ask them for their name and extension and then call the council's contact centre on 0345 600 6400 and ask to speak to them.

Grants of up to £5,000 are available to help deliver activities that benefit residents and communities. The next funding deadline is September 28.

NEXT STEPS FOR LOCAL PLAN

Residents were able to have their say on a new Local Plan for Northumberland in a wide consultation which took place for six weeks in July and August. Over 1,000 people attended 23 events across the county and more than 2,750 comments have been made on the plan.

All feedback will now be taken into account in developing the next version - a 'Publication Draft' - which we will consult on in January 2019. Submission to Government for independent examination is set for May next year.

Emily statueiled

A stunning and thought provoking statue to create a lasting memorial to Northumbrian suffragette Emily Wilding Davison has been unveiled in Morpeth's Carlisle Park.

The statue was commissioned by Northumberland County Council and created by internationally renowned sculptor Ray Lonsdale.

This year marks the 100th anniversary since some women were granted the right to vote. Emily Wilding Davison campaigned passionately for this right and the statue will commemorate her life and achievements and celebrate the huge historical importance of her actions.

Arrested and imprisoned for her part in demonstrations and activities in support of the Women's Social and Political Union, Emily Davison's name became known around the world in June 1913 when she stepped onto the Epsom race track and was struck by the thundering hooves of King George V's horse Anmer.

Emily never recovered from her injuries and died four days later in hospital. She was buried in St Mary's Churchyard in Morpeth.

Emily regularly went on hunger strike when she was imprisoned while campaigning for women's rights and was barbarically force fed with a tube almost 50 times. This has been depicted in the statue which shows Emily tipping out a bowl of food.

An interpretation panel has also been installed to help tell Emily's story, and a walking guide produced so that people can visit the many locations in Morpeth that have a strong connection with Emily, including her grave.

WORK STARTS ON NEW MORPETH FIRST SCHOOL

Work is now well underway on a new £7m first school for Morpeth.

The diggers have moved in on the former fire station site next to County Hall to begin construction of a new two-storey school which includes external play areas, a multi-use games area and parking for almost 80 vehicles.

The scheme also includes the provision of classrooms, including an outdoor one on the roof, and other facilities such as a main hall, studio, staff rooms, offices, kitchen and toilets. The school will also provide a community space at ground-floor level, accessible outside school hours and available to the public for events.

It is due to be completed by September 2019.

The new school will replace the old Morpeth First (Goosehill) School which is in the town centre.

The council worked closely with local parents, residents and the wider community in Morpeth to consult on the new development.

SCHOOLS IN WEST NORTHUMBERLAND

The county council has approved a plan for the creation of a sustainable education system in the west of the county, by extending the age ranges of Greenhaugh, Bellingham, Wark, Kielder and Otterburn Schools.

A £5.1m injection of cash was approved to enable the creation of a 0-11 preschool and primary provision.

SIGNIFICANT INVESTMENT

Significant investment was also approved for Haydon Bridge High School, which will be used to rationalise buildings, better safeguard the site and upgrade the interior of the remaining buildings.

Council officers are developing plans to replace the buildings of Hexham Middle School and Queen Elizabeth High School, which form the Hadrian Learning Trust. It is estimated that this work would cost in the region of £36-40m.



PONTELAND

In Ponteland, progress is continuing on a multi-million pound development which will see the existing Ponteland leisure centre demolished and replaced with a much improved facility and a state of the art secondary school and primary school.

The development will consist of two brand new school buildings and a fantastic new leisure facility to include; swimming pool, fitness suite, badminton courts, outdoor sports fields and a full size 3G pitch and a library. A fire station will also be based on the Callerton Lane site.

The new development is scheduled for completion by September 2020.

Following a £5.8m investment, the new Darras Hall Primary School opened its doors to pupils at the start of the new school term in September.

It's been a "Great" summer across Northumberland as we celebrated our art, culture and heritage.

Great Northumberland put the spotlight on the county with 56 days of exhibitions and live performances, offering free, family-friendly days out.

Part of the Great Exhibition of the North's Inspired By programme, the Great Northumberland Summer programme sought to take advantage of the focus on the region. Launching with a spectacular showcase event in Hexham, the programme also saw one-off art exhibitions; a unique outdoor youth-theatre performance in Prudhoe; a family fun day at Seaton Delaval Hall, a celebration of Northumbrian music in Alnwick and an installation of 600 flags along the beach at Blyth.

It came to a close with a finale event in Berwick with a procession through the town and an evening concert which included the first performance of The Great Song of the North, a specially commissioned suite of music inspired by the county.



DON'T PUT OFF THE FLU VACCINATION

People at most risk from flu are being urged to make sure they get vaccinated against the virus this winter.

> lf you are eligible for the flu vaccine please ensure you get it

Pregnant women, people aged 65 years or over, and adults and children with long term health conditions are known to be at increased risk of the effects of flu and are eligible for a free vaccine.

A nasal spray vaccine is being offered to all children aged 2-9 years old in a bid to slow down the spread of the virus. Young children's close contact with each other means they are more likely to transmit the virus to other more vulnerable groups, including older people. Children in reception and years 1 to 5 will receive their vaccine at school.

Summer heatwave sparks spate of wildfires

Firefighters in Northumberland have tackled a number of wildfires this summer after the enduring heatwave made the countryside dangerously flammable.

While the hot, dry weather was good news for sun seekers, these conditions fuelled a spate of wildfires across the county which spread quickly in the tinder dry countryside.

A large fire ignited on the Linhope Estate south of Wooler following a lightning storm. The estate and the fire service had previously developed a Wildfire Plan which gathered key information such as available water supplies, access routes and the equipment available so they were well prepared to tackle the blaze, keeping people and property safe.

Northumberland Fire and Rescue Service is a lead authority on tackling wildfires with a specialised and experienced team who train regularly. They also provide support and advice to other fire authorities across the country and their expertise was called on to help control and tackle the massive moorland wildfires in Greater Manchester and Lancashire that hit the national headlines this summer.



The wildfire team has over 60 wildfire emergency response plans in place that cover key areas of the county. It will be working with more landowners and managers over the coming year to increase this number further ensuring that all parties are as prepared as they possibly can be in the event of a wildfire.

GOLDEN SUPPORT OF ARMED FORCES

Northumberland County Council has been recognised as one of the best in the UK for supporting members of the Armed Forces.

The authority has been awarded a gold award by the Ministry of Defence in its 2018 Armed Forces Covenant Employer Recognition Scheme.

The scheme rewards and recognises UK employers and organisations that show outstanding support to the armed forces community.

The council was one of just nine local authorities across the whole of the UK to receive the coveted gold award.



PARKING PLANS SWING INTO ACTION

Action plans are underway to improve car parking in some of the county's town centres.



Last year the County Council commissioned consultants to carry out parking studies and survey work in Morpeth, Hexham, Berwick and Alnwick, to develop options for future parking needs in these towns.

Detailed work has been carried out to seek the views and opinions of the local county councillors, town councils and other key stakeholders on the findings of the consultants' studies and get their recommendations on a range of potential measures to help address parking issues in their areas. Individual parking action plans have now been developed for each of the four towns, with a number of changes already introduced across the summer.

The Council has allocated £10m funding for this work and to support parking improvements in other locations.

FOR LEISURE

New hospital and leisure facilities for Berwick

Plans for a new leisure facility – co-located with a new hospital on the site of the current Swan Centre – have been given the go-ahead by council leaders.

A landmark decision to re-develop the leisure centre gives the green light to an integrated development which will see over £45 million invested in the town.

The new development – which will see all services on the current sites retained – represents the very latest thinking by linking treating illness with preventing it in the first place. Similar health and wellbeing integration has already been tried in other areas of the country with great success.

The County Council's Cabinet approved a £20m leisure centre at the Swan Centre site earlier this month.

The Swan Centre – built in the early 90's – is increasingly showing its age and needs significant investment to bring it up to modern standards. Detailed design work is pending but it has already been agreed that it will include state of the art pool and sports facilities, as well as access to playing pitches.

County Council Leader Peter Jackson said:

We're delighted to formally progress this flagship project for Berwick and Northumberland which will bring significant investment to the town.

"The next stage is to develop detailed designs for the new leisure centre, tre rs. and we're determined this is progressed as soon as

possible with state-of-theart facilities. "By integrating a community hospital with leisure facilities, people will have easier access to the sports centre and therefore are more likely to use it. This will ultimately benefit overall health and wellbeing, leading to

healthier lifestyles."

Could you be a Shared Lives carer?

People in Northumberland are being asked if they would like to share their lives, acting in a carer role to support adults with specific needs.

Shared Lives Northumberland provides support in a family home for adults who are unable to live alone because of their age or disability.

The initiative provides skilled, trained and committed people who have chosen to share their homes and their lives with others.

Carers are given training and paid an allowance to provide accommodation and support for short periods up to a few days a week; a couple of weeks; or longer.

The project is particularly interested in hearing from adults who would like to care for people with specific care needs around mobility, mental health and young adults who have turned 18 and are coming out of foster care.

Shared Lives manager Julie Shepherd said:

"Shared Lives carers can transform someone's life by giving vulnerable adults the chance to learn new skills and live a more independent life."



"We really hope that we can get more people involved as Shared Lives carers."

Shared Lives Northumberland is delivered through a partnership between Northumbria Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust which manages the service on behalf of Northumberland County Council.


