The county is hosting Stage Three of the prestigious Ovo Energy Tour of Britain on Monday 9 September.

The race will see the world's top riders and teams contesting a 182 kilometre route which will start in Berwick, passing along the Tweed Valley to Wooler before heading down the Northumberland coastline into North Tyneside and culminating in a dramatic finish in Newcastle.

County Council Leader Peter Jackson said: "This will be a fantastic spectacle and will showcase our wonderful communities, iconic landmarks and amazing landscapes to an international audience, while providing a multi-million pound boost to the local economy.

"The race also gives residents and cycling fans the opportunity to see the world's best riders competing right here on their doorstep. We have been working with schools, communities and businesses to get them involved in the day, and I am sure the thousands of spectators lining the route will give the cyclists a rousing welcome."

The 2019 race begins in Glasgow on Saturday 7 September, finishing eight days later in Manchester city centre on Saturday 14 September.

ITV4 will screen live coverage of each stage, along with a nightly highlights programme of the best of the action.

An ambitious, multi million pound investment programme is set to transform sport and leisure facilities in Northumberland and enhance the customer experience.

The £65 million investment package, funded by Northumberland County Council, includes the building of three new leisure centres in Berwick, Morpeth and Ponteland, major funding to refurbish and revitalise two other centres in Blyth and Hexham and a county wide swimming pool refurbishment scheme.



Morpeth's plans for a new £18 million state of the art leisure centre are progressing with the Terrace Site on Gas House Lane being chosen as the location for the facility.

The Centre will provide a community and wellness hub for the town and surrounding areas and will attract thousands of visitors throughout the year.

The new, central facility will provide wider access to a range of activities which will benefit the thousands of people who will use it every year.

We are now working with Active Northumberland and the public to see which facilities to include in the scheme with further consultation events due to take place in the near future.



BERWICK'S £20M LEISURE CENTRE SET FOR NOVEMBER START

Work on Berwick's new state-of-the-art £20 million leisure centre is due to start in November and be completed by July 2022.

The centre will be built on the current Swan Centre site in Tweedmouth and will feature a five-lane, 25m swimming pool, a teaching pool and leisure pool and spa facilities. There will be a new state of the art gym and fitness studios, a sports hall, indoor bowls, soft play, a cafe and a sensory room. Outside there will be a 3G full-size playing pitch, play park and trim trail with parking for 175 cars.

The work will be carried out in phases to ensure that the existing Swan Centre continues to operate at all times until new facilities open to replace them.

FLAGSHIP PONTELAND SPORTS CENTRE LAYOUT REVEALED

A flagship new sports and leisure centre in Ponteland is to boast some of the industry's finest fitness equipment and facilities, while providing members with a whole new customer experience for all ages of the local community.

The leisure complex forms part of the new £46 million education and leisure development in the town. Covering three floors, it will incorporate a Clip n Climb wall, a soft play, a four court sports hall



with indoor cricket nets, a 6-lane 25 metre swimming pool and a learner pool and aqua play.

There will also be a spa featuring a steam room and sauna and a cafe and function suite with a viewing terrace.

A state of the art 100 station gym will feature designated exercise zones covering functional training, sports performance and strength.

There will also be outdoor sports fields, a multi-use games area, and a full size 3G pitch which will be used by both the schools and the local community.

Work is now progressing rapidly on the development on Callerton Lane which is due to be completed in time for the new school year in September 2020.



£5 MILLION INVESTMENT TO MODERNISE BLYTH **SPORTS CENTRE**

The council is investing £5 million to completely modernise Blyth Sports Centre.

The funding will be used to give the centre a major facelift, improve sports and leisure facilities and create a wellness hub for the local community.

Plans are in place to create a new state of the art gym and fitness area, a dedicated cycling studio, a new and improved soft play experience and an extended catering offer.

There will also be a new and improved spa and two renovated studios, while the toilets and changing rooms will be refurbished and the pool hall refreshed and redecorated.

A re-designed modern and welcoming reception area will improve the customer experience.

It is hoped that work will be able to start on site in Autumn 2019. The work will be carried out on a phased basis so the centre will remain open and any impact on the public minimised.

Up to 1,000 new council owned homes are to be built in the county over the next three years providing much needed affordable housing for Northumberland residents in need.

The homes will be of varying sizes with options for the elderly, for families and for single people. They will be built in small pockets across the county in areas where they are needed most.

The lack of affordable housing is a big challenge for Northumberland and too many people, especially the young, are being forced to move away from the communities they grew up in because they have been priced out of the local housing market.

Providing quality, affordable homes for rent will help to keep young people in the county who will in turn support local businesses and services and help to keep our communities vibrant.

MULTI MILLION UPGRADE OF COUNCIL HOUSES

We are investing £10 million a year for the next eight years in our council houses. We are making sure our existing tenants all live in modern and energy efficient properties by installing new kitchens, bathrooms, heating systems, insulation, doors and windows.



RAIN DOESN'T 'STEEL' THE SHOW ON PONTELAND SITE VISIT

Work is progressing well on the groundbreaking schools and leisure development in Ponteland.

Students from the town's high school have been visiting the site and seeing the structural steel frame for the secondary school starting to take shape.

The project is one of the largest school and leisure complexes ever to be developed in Northumberland and will incorporate new primary and secondary schools as well as state of the art leisure facilities, a library and community facilities.

The development is being funded by Northumberland County Council and built by Kier Construction. It is scheduled for completion by September 2020.

Successful summer holiday camps SET TO RETURN

Such was the success of holiday camps for children in Blyth and Red Row last year, that they are returning again this summer.

One hundred and twenty children aged between five and 14 benefited from four weeks of fun and inspiring activities while learning and developing their personal skills and building confidence.

Signed up through their schools the children enjoyed sports, bushcraft skills, art, first aid, team building, surfing, orienteering, problem solving, party games, sing-alongs and day trips around the region.

The summer holiday activities were organised by Northumberland County Council and delivered by Leading Link along with a range of other partner organisations.

All of the children at the Blyth sessions had their achievements acknowledged through Children's University 'passports' which were funded by Blyth Town Council, and this year the children at Red Row will receive CU passports too.

Leading Link put forward a team of young people to help run the sessions and to act as ambassadors and role models for the children. They are trained through the Children's University and themselves gain leadership, life and work skills.

"It's given some of them the chance to shine and feel valued and experience so many new skills."

Emma Richardson a senior manager at Northumberland County Council said: "It's wonderful that the children are able to take part in engaging, interesting activities during the summer holidays, and there are huge long term benefits too. What we're doing is planting seeds for the future for these young people - teaching them life skills, building confidence and helping them to make new friends. The children are learning while having fun and you never know, an activity that they try for

the first time on the scheme may develop into a hobby or even a potential career.

Last year's summer holiday provision gained Government funding that was secured through Children North-East. This year Northumberland County Council, the schools and community partners have put together a funding package to further develop these 'more than the school day' activities.

Walk your way to health

Free health walks are taking place across the county to encourage more people to get out into the great outdoors and improve their health.

The walks, laid on by Active Northumberland, are suitable for all levels of ability and take between half an hour and an hour and a half.

If you fancy giving it a go - all you need is a pair of comfortable shoes with good grip and support for your feet. If it's a hot day make sure you take a bottle of water and always wear clothing appropriate for the weather. You'll have great company, trained walk leaders and safe walking routes to get you on your way to a healthier lifestyle.

Walking is a low impact exercise that has been shown to reduce the risk of chronic illnesses such as heart disease, type 2 diabetes, dementia, stroke and some cancers. Getting out in the fresh air with friends can also help combat loneliness and depression.

BUGGY FIT CLASS FOR NEW MUMS

A great new outdoor exercise class for post natal mums and their babies is running in Newbiggin and Blyth.

Buggy Fit, run by Active Northumberland, is designed specifically for mums from 6 weeks after birth (or 12 weeks after a caesarean section) and for as long as your little one is happy in their buggy.

The classes are a great way to spend some time outdoors, to exercise without the need for childcare, and to meet other new mums.

Exercises include a brisk walk with the buggy and safe cardio and toning exercises designed to help you recover and regain fitness after pregnancy and childbirth.

The class will run on a Friday morning between 10.30 - 11.30am, meeting at Newbiggin Leisure Centre before venturing down to the sea front.

The Blyth class meets at the Dave Stephens centre at the beach, every Wednesday 10.30am - 11.30am.

Classes cost £2. There is no need to book, just turn up on the day in comfortable footwear and clothing - and bring a drink too.

Before taking part in this class, you must:

- 1 Be 6 weeks post natal (or 12 weeks after a c-section)
- Have had an 'all clear' 6 week postnatal check
- 3 Arrange a FREE abdominal check with one of our qualified instructors. This is a quick check to make sure your core muscles are ready for exercise. Please contact Jemma (details below) to organise this.

FULL OF PRIDE

Northumberland County Council and Northumbria Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust were proud to stand together to support Northumberland Pride in June.

The Council and Trust has a joint LGBT+ staff network group to help both organisations develop policies and procedures that are LGBT+ friendly. The great work was reflected this year when the Council was ranked in the top 100 Stonewall Workplace Equality Index and Northumbria Healthcare staff ranked the Trust the best in the NHS for morale, and the best for diversity, equality and inclusion in the national NHS staff survey.

NEWS in Brief



A DANCE FOR NORTHUMBERLAND

A youth group is to create a modern dance for Northumberland based on folk traditions. Dance Dynamics Youth Group, with members aged 3-18, will team up with creative ageing charity Equal Arts, Northumberland County Council and Northumberland Archives to explore and recreate traditional dances from across the decades. The project will give older people living in care and the wider community the opportunity to share their memories and help with this exciting new dance that can be shared for generations to come.



ROAD IMPROVEMENT WORKS ROLLED OUT

Work is well underway on the council's summer programme to make travelling on Northumberland's roads a smoother experience.

Around 60 miles of roads across 40 areas will be repaired and improved.

The work forms part of the council's Local Transport Plan Programme, and this year the authority will be investing £26m in maintaining and improving the county's highway and transport network.

FUNDING HOPES TO RESTORE UNION CHAIN BRIDGE

A strong bid for Heritage Lottery funding has been submitted to back a £7.3m overhaul of the Union Chain Bridge which links Scotland and England near Berwick. If successful it would allow work to restore the 200 year old bridge to start early next year.

START OF WORK ON NEW FIRE STATION AT PONTELAND

Work has started on the construction of a new community fire station on Callerton Lane in Ponteland. The new station will replace the existing 1970s building which is being displaced by the development of two new schools, a leisure centre and sports facilities in the area.



RED SQUIRREL FREE **RESCUE ON** WOOLER **COMMON**

A baby red squirrel is making a good recovery at a local wildlife sanctuary after being found cold and distressed on Wooler Common.

An Animal Welfare Officer from Northumberland County Council was on a routine patrol in the area last month when she was called over by a forestry worker who had spotted the small squirrel.

They observed it for a while on the public path and it was clearly in distress, running round and round in circles, cold and drenched right through from being in a small nearby stream.





The animal welfare officer who rescued the squirrel said:

"We think it had fallen from its drey high up in a tree and had received a big bump. It was very disorientated and while we don't like to interfere with wildlife, this little squirrel clearly needed help.

"I took it to a wildlife rescue centre in Blyth where it is now safe, warm and tucking into milk substitute. We hope that when he grows a little and is fully recovered we will be able to release him back where we found him."

The area is a haven for red squirrels and local volunteers support the squirrel population by erecting and filling feeders.

John Anderson who manages Blyth Wildlife Sanctuary said:

"We are feeding him regularly with substitute milk but as he will be released back into the wild when he his is strong enough we are being very careful to ensure minimal handling. It is the same person that feeds him each day, to prevent familiarity with humans.

"We will be using a soft release approach, so instead of just releasing the squirrel straight back into the wild, we will form an enclosure in the woods so he can get used to the sights, sounds and smells and have access to food before he is fully released. We will then keep the enclosure and food in place for a time afterwards so he can return to it if he wishes."

NEW MARKET TRADER DISCOUNT SCHEME

We've launched a new financial incentive scheme to encourage would-be traders to take a stall at one of the county's vibrant markets.

DUMPING GARDEN WASTE WILL DAMAGE COASTAL ECOSYSTEM

We've received reports of residents fly tipping garden waste on beaches and dunes along the Northumberland Coast which is illegal and damaging the local ecosystem.



There is a belief among local residents and gardening contractors that as it is garden waste, it is helping the land and therefore it does not count as fly-tipping.

Most of the coastal grasslands and dune systems on the Northumberland coast are protected for their important flora.

The dumping of grass cuttings and other garden waste enriches the soil which encourages the growth of weed species such as docks and nettles, which out compete the wildflowers. Garden plants are also accidentally introduced into the

grasslands which out compete native wildflowers causing the loss of important dune grassland plants.

No matter what the waste, or the reasons behind it, fly tipping will never be tolerated. Those caught fly tipping face being issued with a £400 fixed penalty notice or may be prosecuted for the offence.

There are free facilities available to householders at all of Northumberland's household recycling centres and we operate a household garden waste collection service for a small fee.
