2018YEAR

It's been a busy and exciting year for Northumberland.

Here's a snapshot of some of the work and events that took place during the year to help boost jobs, the local economy, improve our environment and our communities.

JANUARY

Following a £500,000 investment by the council, the doors to the newly refurbished Queen's Hall in Hexham re-opened to the public, marking the beginning of a new era for the historic building which now houses the town's library, customer and visitor information centre all under one roof.

FEBRUARY

During the winter storm dubbed The Beast from the East, council teams worked with emergency services around the clock to keep the county's 3,000 mile road network moving, footpaths clear, essential services up and running and providing extra support for the elderly and vulnerable in our communities.

MARCH

The authority placed a purge on potholes as one of its top priorities and committed an extra £3m specifically to help repair the county's road network which was damaged by the severe winter weather.



APRIL N

Bespoke action plans were developed to improve car parking in Hexham, Berwick, Alnwick and Morpeth following detailed parking studies in these towns. The council has allocated £10m to fund these parking improvements.



MAY

The Green Dog Walkers Scheme which encourages responsible dog ownership in Northumberland signed up its 1,000th member. The scheme is a community-led programme to reduce dog fouling across the county.



JUNE

Some of the finest locally produced food and drink took centre stage in a special showcase event in the Houses of Parliament. Produced in Northumberland, run by the council, highlights and promotes local businesses that make, sell or serve food and drink produced within the county.







INREVIEW



JULY

Great Northumberland put the spotlight on the county with 56 days of exhibitions and live performances, offering free, family-friendly days out. It was inspired by the Great Exhibition of the North and sought to take advantage of the focus on the region.

AUGUST

Pupils across Northumberland were celebrating as they received their GCSE and A level results. This year has seen an increase in the percentage of students in the county achieving a good pass at GCSE (Grades 9 to 5) and more A level students have achieved higher grades.

SEPTEMBER

A multi-million pound investment in a new leisure centre for Berwick was announced.

The council approved £20m for the new build at the Swan Centre to provide a first class centre with a state of the art pool and sports facilities for residents and tourists.



OCTOBER

The Education Minister made a visit to a newly built £5.8m Darras Hall Primary School meeting pupils, teachers and politicians - and unveiled a plaque to declare the school officially open.



NOVEMBER

The new North of Tyne Authority Cabinet met for the first time, after the £600m devolution deal was approved by Government. It will benefit people, communities and businesses across the region.



DECEMBER

Five new state-of the-art gritters have joined the council's fleet of salt spreaders as the council's winter operations get into full swing. The new machines will play a key role in keeping the county's 3,000 miles of roads safe for drivers.







Health and Wellbeing



Winter can be challenging on our health, especially for older people and those with long-term conditions. But there are a number of things we can all do to help prepare for the cold weather and ward off common winter illnesses:



PROTECT AGAINST FLU

Don't put off getting the flu vaccination. If you're eligible get it now from your GP or local pharmacy offering the service.

Recommended for:

- Pregnant women
- Anyone over 65
- For your children if they're aged two to four. This is not an injection, just a quick nasal spray
- If you're the main carer of an older or disabled person
- If you have a long term health condition such as bronchitis, diabetes, heart, kidney or liver disease.



FLU AND FIRST SIGNS

If you start to feel unwell, at the first sign of a winter illness, even if it is just a cough or cold, get expert confidential advice from your pharmacist before it gets more serious.

PICK UP A PRESCRIPTION

Pick up any prescription medicines before your GP or Pharmacy close for Christmas and keep stocked up with medication such as paracetamol or ibuprofen so you can deal with common winter illnesses.

KEEP WARM AND WELL

It's important to keep warm in winter both indoors and outdoors as it can help prevent colds, flu and more serious health problems.



BE A GOOD NEIGHBOUR

Keep an eye on elderly or frail friends, neighbours and relatives. Make sure they are warm enough, have plenty of food and medication to see them through the winter period.

If you do need help over the holiday period:

- GP surgeries offer extended opening hours into the evenings and weekends
- If you need urgent medical help fast, call NHS 111 at any time
- If it is life-threatening or an emergency, call 999

Be prepared for Universal Credit

Universal Credit is now being introduced across Northumberland so you need to get prepared now. Here's how!

- 1. Open a bank account: even if you have a poor credit rating, you can open a 'Basic Bank Account'. Go to a local bank and they will help you. You will need to take proof of identity (such as your driving licence) and proof of address (such as your heating bill).
- 2. Get on the internet: You will have to make your application for Universal Credit benefits on the internet. There are lots of places in Northumberland where you can use a computer for free, such as your local job centre and library and learn how to get online. Call us on 0345 600 6400 to find out about free courses.
- 3. Set up a standing order or direct debit: this means you won't have to remember to pay your rent on time as it will be taken from your account automatically. Your bank can help you do this.



- **4. Come and talk to us:** Residents who need digital support when applying for Universal Credit, or are struggling with payment changes should:
- Contact their landlord if they are in council or social housing.
- Visit their local Northumberland County Council Customer Information Centre or call the Customer Service helpline: **0345 600 6400**.
- Contact Citizens Advice Northumberland: 01670 339 781.
- Visit their local Job Centre.

Adapt (NE) - providing community services across Northumberland

Adapt (NE) is a community-based organisation providing services to people in Northumberland and beyond, with the aim of promoting an inclusive society. As well as providing community transport services, the county-wide Getabout Scheme helps people get to medical and other appointments, either via public transport or with the help of a volunteer car driver.

A new community cafe opened at the Hexham site this year, which houses a Changing Places accessible toilet. Changing Places toilets have more space and equipment, including a height adjustable changing bench and a hoist. One of just three in Northumberland, the toilet is available for anyone who needs it, whilst visiting, or travelling through the town.

Adapt (NE) also provides the Independent NHS Complaints Advocacy Service for Northumberland and delivers Healthwatch Northumberland (see across), plus a wheelchair loan and DBS checking service.

The newly launched Personal Assistant Register held by Adapt (NE) enables people looking to work as a personal assistant or carer to be matched with local people looking for help. Call for details.

Don't be a turkey with your health

Take care when preparing your family's Christmas meals, or you could be drowning your sorrows rather than toasting the festive season.

One of the seasonal highlights of Christmas is the lunch, with poultry being the most popular choice of meat. However, all types of meat carry potentially harmful bacteria capable of causing food poisoning.

Avoiding sloppy hygiene and by taking a few minutes extra care you could prevent days of stomach upsets and suffering.



- Always wash your hands with soap and hot water before and after handling the raw bird. All work surfaces, equipment and food contact surfaces should be washed and disinfected again before re-use.
- **2.** Always keep raw poultry separate from ready to eat foods.
- 3. If you buy a frozen bird, ensure that it has thawed completely. An 8kg turkey will take approximately four days to thaw in the fridge. Make sure the raw poultry doesn't touch other foods.
- **4.** Remove the giblets and take great care when disposing of the defrosted juices.
- There is no need to rinse poultry under the tap – this can splash harmful bacteria around the kitchen.
- 6. Cook the bird as soon as possible after it has completely thawed. Never part cook the poultry the night before.
- 7. Ensure the turkey is thoroughly cooked. Check there are no pink bits in the middle and between the legs, that the juices run clear and that it is

- piping hot throughout (always follow the instructions on the packaging).
- **8.** Cook the stuffing separately, as it allows heat to fully penetrate the carcass.
- Eat the bird as soon as possible after cooking. Cool leftovers quickly and avoid reheating food more than once.
- **10.** If you do reheat leftovers, make sure they are piping hot throughout.

MAKE SURE YOU ARE REGISTERED TO VOTE

Our electoral service team is currently producing the county's register of electors for the coming year. They have recently delivered over 150,000 household enquiry forms across the county and are currently following up with reminder activity where a response has yet to be received. If you were unable to respond to the first form you received, please be certain to respond to your reminder form.

HOME MOVERS - HAVE YOU FORGOTTEN SOMETHING?

One of the biggest reasons that people fall off the electoral register is by simply moving house. When people move house they usually remember to contact their banks and utilities providers with new address details but they often forget to update their electoral registration details.

If you've moved house in recent months and haven't taken steps to re-register with your new address you can register online at www.gov.uk/register-to-vote.

The "hidden" benefits to registering - Lenders use the electoral register to help confirm your identity before they will consider offering credit. Being on the register could help you get a loan, mortgage and credit cards.

COULD YOU BE A DIGITAL CHAMPION?

The online and digital world can be tricky to negotiate for large numbers of Northumberland residents - and especially so for those with no online access at all.

That's why we're calling for volunteers to help local people to get to grips with computers and take their first steps online.

You don't need to be an IT wizard - although if you are that would be great - you just need a bit of patience and IT know-how, to help them build their confidence to get online.

Participants range from the elderly to younger manual workers who have never had call to use computers.

You will be showing them the basics IT skills such as getting online for the first time, or teaching them how to upload digital photos, hunt for jobs, shop and bank online or keep in touch with family and friends using Facebook, email or Skype.

Volunteers would need to be able to get access to a local library where the sessions are held.

Digital Champion, Allan Wilson said:

"It's a voluntary but very rewarding role. To see someone leave with a smile on their face when they have been provided with skills and knowledge that enable them to better handle the requirements of a modern digital world make it especially satisfying and worthwhile."

SPREADING THE WORD ON WINTER READINESS

Northurppopland

A dedicated team is ready to tackle the worst the winter weather can throw at us.

With a fleet of 28 front-line gritters at their disposal, including five brand new models, winter services staff have been preparing for months to keep roads safe and clear over the colder months.

As the Beast from the East showed last winter, battling the elements during the worst weather is a 24/7 job. To keep the gritters active across Northumberland's 3,000 miles of road, the council has invested in 37,500 tonnes of rock salt, filling the depots to capacity.

Safety for the drivers is paramount, and all gritters are fitted with tracking devices so their location can be pinpointed at all times - providing an extra level of safety, especially for those working in more rural areas.

Leading the team are three experienced, specialist winter service managers and decision makers who monitor all forecast weather and weather stations round-theclock and co-ordinate operations across the county.

Of course, keeping the region moving is all about teamwork. The council has arrangements in place with all neighbouring authorities to ensure continuity between area boundaries.

It also now salts the entire length of the A69 from Newcastle to the M6 in Cumbria and completes the weather forecasting and decision making for Newcastle City Council's winter services operation.

And if things get really bad the council can also call on farmers and subcontractors should they be needed.

So whatever happens weather-wise over the next few months, the council will be hitting the road to keep you safe.

Drive continues to keep our roadsides clean

Northumberland has a well-deserved and longstanding reputation as a clean and tidy county, home to more than 300,000 residents and attracting millions of visitors each year.

And while the vast majority of residents and drivers dispose of their rubbish properly, the actions of a small minority are costing everyone.

Litter and rubbish which is either dropped in the street or thrown from vehicles casts a real blight and clearing up litter costs the council around £2.6m each year. There are over 3,000 miles of roads in Northumberland and keeping them clean and tidy is a year-round job.

Now a roadside litter campaign is aimed at encouraging people not to drop litter and be proud of their county.

Advertising has been running on the backs of buses around the county, as well as on petrol pumps, reminding drivers and passengers not to drop rubbish from their vehicles and 'love their county'.

Clean-ups are taking place on roadsides to remove litter, while the impact of litter and rubbish, not just as an eyesore, but a danger to health of humans and animals, is also being highlighted.

Meanwhile the council will continue to take enforcement action where they have evidence of littering. This year over 100 people have been fined or prosecuted for dropping litter.

Councillor Glen Sanderson, Cabinet Member for Environment and Local Services, with Northumberland County Council, said: "Northumberland has a well-deserved reputation as a clean county and we want to keep it that way.

"It's not difficult to put litter in a bin or take it home and we hope this campaign will act as a gentle reminder to everyone to play their part in keeping the county litter-free."

A new era in local decision making is underway after government approved a £600m North of Tyne devolution deal.

The new North of Tyne Combined Authority, made up of Northumberland, Newcastle and North Tyneside Councils, has been formally brought into law by Parliament.

The deal will drive economic growth, job creation, support for people and their families, rural communities and inward investment.

As well as receiving £20m in government funding every year for the next 30 years, the Combined Authority is expected to:

- generate £1.1bn for the local economy
- create 10,000 new jobs
- bring in more than £2.1bn in private sector investment.

County Council Leader Peter Jackson said:

"So much work has gone into securing the best deal for the North of Tyne and I'm delighted we're now moving forward with the real business of driving the region's economic growth.

"We're working on a number of exciting and transformative schemes which will benefit millions of people in the region now, as well as future generations, and we are all excited by the opportunities that lie ahead."

Northern Powerhouse Minister, Jake Berry MP, added: "Thanks to the hard work of local leaders, we have delivered a historic devolution deal in the Northern Powerhouse and over half a billion pounds of investment into North Tyneside, Northumberland and Newcastle to improve services, create new jobs and drive growth.

"We're transferring funding and decision making away from Westminster and placing them directly into the hands of local people, allowing them to shape their own public services and forge their own destiny."

Investment continues in education in the county

A NEW FIRST SCHOOL FOR MORPETH

Work is well underway on construction of a brand new £6.8m educational facility on the former fire station site in Morpeth which will replace the ageing 'Goosehill' First School.

Teachers and students from Morpeth First School recently joined county councillors to view progress on the site of the new school, which is due to open in September 2019.

The new building will provide innovative teaching and learning facilities as well as external play areas and a multi-use games area. For the first time in its history the school will have its own playing fields.

The new school will also have a community room, which will be used for events both during and outside of school hours, along with 78 parking spaces.



SCHOOLS IN WEST NORTHUMBERLAND

In July 2018 the council agreed plans to create a sustainable education system in the west of the county.

This is seeing significant investment in Haydon Bridge High School - in resources to support improvements to meet high standards of education, and over £3m to improve buildings on the site.

Age ranges will be extended at Greenhaugh, Bellingham, Wark, Kielder and Otterburn first schools - with the total investment of £5.1m in creating primary and secondary education provision.

Council officers are progressing with plans to replace the buildings of Hexham Middle School and Queen Elizabeth High School, which form the Hadrian Learning Trust. It is expected that between £36m and £40m will be invested in this scheme.

PONTELAND PARTNERSHIP OF SCHOOLS

Secretary of State for Education, The Rt Hon Damian Hinds MP, visited the new £5.8million Darras Hall Primary School - meeting pupils, teachers and politicians - and unveiling a plaque to declare the school officially open.

The new primary school, built by Northumberland County Council, features state of the art facilities including 15 classrooms, 'learning streets' on both the ground and first floors, two multi use studios, a hall that can be used for both school and community events and a library and reading area.

The Secretary of State was in the region to unveil a £24 million investment that will help further unlock the immense talent of young people in this region.

The investment in Darras Hall is part of a wider £57m investment by the council in education and leisure across the

NEWS ON THE NEW SCHOOLS AND LEISURE DEVELOPMENT:

The contract to build the landmark combined schools and leisure campus in Ponteland has been awarded to Kier Construction - and key councillors and partners dug the first turf on the site at the end of November.

The £46m development will see the existing leisure centre demolished and replaced with two brand new school buildings and a fantastic new leisure facility with swimming pool, fitness suite, community facilities, badminton courts, Clip N Climb, soft play, outdoor sports fields, a full size 3G pitch and a library. A new fire station will also be built.

The new development is scheduled for completion by September 2020 and work is underway to expand the accommodation on the existing high school, to take the additional secondary pupils that will come to the school in September 2019.

Other schools across the Ponteland Partnership have also benefited from significant investment in their buildings as part of the scheme.
