1. Funding of up to £5,000 Available to Tackle Problems within Families (UK) Registered charities that work to tackle family problems or problems facing one or more of its members can apply for grants of between £1,000 and £5,000. Funding is available for both capital and revenue grants as well as grants for core funding and projects-based grants. The funding is being made available through the Kelly Family Charitable Trust which actively encourages applications from relatively new organisations to help them become established. The trust prefers to support charities whose income is below £500,000. However, larger charities with pioneering pilot projects will be considered. The next closing date for applications is the 1st March 2020. To be directed to the funders website: click here

2. Funding for Capital Projects in Secondary Schools and Sixth Form Colleges (UK) From the 1st May 2020, secondary schools and colleges that have reached a level of excellence will be eligible to apply for a grant of up to £100,000 towards 50% of the cost of capital projects. A total of around £1.75 million will be allocated each year to new build, refurbishment or equipment projects related to the teaching of science and technology or information or communications technology directly related to learning for projects involving libraries, languages, music or the arts. The funding will be made available through the Wolfson Foundation's Secondary Education Programme. The closing date for applications will be the 10th June 2020. 3. Reggs Foundation Local Community Projects Fund (England, Scotland & Wales) Not-for-profit organisations developing local community projects are being offered the opportunity to apply for a grant of up to £2,000. Any not for profit organisation working to reduce disadvantage experienced by the most deprived people in the community such as the disabled, those living in poverty, voluntary carers and isolated older people can apply. Larger organisations with a turnover in excess of £300,000 are unlikely to be successful with those located near to a Reggs shop most likely to receive awards. All projects must support a community of interest, i.e. people who are disabled or suffering chronic illness, living in poverty, voluntary carers, homeless people, isolated older people or other demonstrably significant need. 4. Grants to Enhance the Teaching of Mathematics (UK) The London Mathematical Society has announced that Mathematics Teachers in the UK can apply for grants of up to £400 to attend specific one or two-day conferences/events organised by professional mathematical organisations. The grant can contribute to the costs of registration for the course and a proportion of the travel and subsistence expenses of attendees. Any application for a grant under this scheme must be made by a teacher of mathematics or ITE provider based in the UK. The grants are open to teachers of mathematics from primary school to A-Level or equivalent (inclusive of STEP/AE). The next closing date for applications is the 30th April 2020. 5. Joseph Rowntree Charitable Trust Sustainable Futures Fund (UK) The Joseph Rowntree Charitable Trust recognises that climate change caused by human activity is threatening the well-being of humanity and that the wealthiest countries and individuals are responsible for a disproportionate share of emissions, whilst the poorest countries and sections of society are the most vulnerable to the impacts of climate change. Grants are available from a few hundred pounds to over £100,000 and may be single payments or spread over up to three years. Funding priorities are: Better economics - with grants funding work that explores how sustainability rather than traditional forms of economic growth Beyond consumerism - funded work will include that which engages people individually and collectively in moving culture away from consumerism and towards more sustainable ways of living. New Voices - funding for campaigns and movements that enable marginalised groups and young activists to have a voice in decisions which affect them. The funding to apply is up to £23,000. 6. Tesco Bags of Help Grants Programme Opens for 2020 Applications Community groups and schools can now apply for funding of up to £2,000 for projects in England, Wales and Scotland that benefit their local community. The funding has been made available by the Tesco's Bags of Help programme which is administered by Groundwork, and can cover a broad range of projects and can be used to: purchase sports kit, litter pickers, camping equipment; improvements to buildings; the development of outdoor space such as a play area or woodland; running a community event or supporting seasonal activities. Applications are assessed by Groundwork to ensure they are eligible. Three community projects in each local area will be voted on by customers in Tesco stores, with projects changing every three months. Following the vote, the project that received the most votes in its area will receive a grant of up to £2,000, second place receiving up to £1,000 and third place up to £500. The types of organisations that can apply include: Voluntary or community organisations (including registered charities/companies), Schools, Health bodies (e.g. Clinical Commissioning Groups (CCGs), NHS Hospital Trusts, Foundation Trusts) and Parish/Town Councils. 7. Funding for Classical Music Lessons, Instruments and Courses (UK) Individuals of school age, teachers and schools can now apply for grants of up to £2,000 towards classical music lessons, instruments and courses. The funding aims to inspire and encourage a new generation of classical musicians and composers, and help children afford a classical music education, no matter what their financial background. Decca record label in the UK is supporting the launch of the new Universal Music UK Sound Foundation bursary - the Decca Bursary. The closing date for applications is the 14th February 2020. 8. Funding for Financial Literacy Projects (UK) The MSE Charity has announced that its grants programme will re-open for applications on the 3rd February 2020. The charity gives grants to not for profit organisations that deliver activities which make a lasting impact on how people think, behave and manage their money. Grants of up to £5,000 are available for projects that aim to make people living with 'Long Term Challenges' become more financially capable. Grants will be offered to build financial capability by assisting groups who support people living with dementia, autism, learning difficulties, disabilities, caring responsibilities, mental illness, brain injuries and strokes. Eligible applicants will be registered charities, Community Interest Companies (CICs) and other not for profit companies and Credit Unions. 9. Sustainable Urban Development (Low Carbon) (North East) Sustainable Urban Development call to run a project to support the shift towards a low carbon economy which must cover the North East Local Enterprise Partnership area (NELP). This call is looking to support the shift towards a low carbon economy and specifically: Promoting the production and distribution of energy derived from renewable resources Promoting energy efficiency and renewable energy use in enterprises Supporting energy efficiency, smart energy management and renewable energy use in public infrastructure, including in public buildings, and in the housing sector Promoting low-carbon strategies for all types of territories, in particular for urban areas, including the promotion of sustainable multimodal urban mobility and mitigation-relevant adaptation measures Promoting research and innovation in, and adoption of, low-carbon technologies. 10. Future looking good youth (safe place to be) (UK) Funding to help develop community businesses (UK) - 25 years old from groups under-served by current services, video propose to build a clearly demonstrate how they will help young people build a positive future, building the skills necessary to live with dignity and be able to access basic housing and create a happy home in which they feel safe and secure. Comic relief in partnership with The KFC foundation the programme provides grants of £100,000 to £200,000. 11. Funding for research and projects that address severe learning disabilities (UK) The Baily Thomas Charitable Trust is a registered charity which was established to provide both research and project funding in the areas of severe learning difficulties, including autism for both children and adults. Grants are made to cover capital projects and core costs to include staff costs, general running and office costs at charitable organisations, schools and centres. Applications will only be considered from voluntary organisations which are registered charities or are associated with a registered charity. Schools and Parent Teacher Associations and Industrial & Provident Societies can also apply. Funding in the past has ranged in value from £350 to £150,000. Application deadline for those seeking in excess of £10,000 is the 1st March 2020. Applications for £10,000 or below can be submitted at any time. To be directed to the funders website: click here

12. Funding for areas least engaged in the arts and culture (England) The Arts Council of England has launched the 2nd funding round of the Creative People and Places Fund. Funding for projects focused on improving children's wellbeing during the period in which they move from elite to less advantaged backgrounds (e.g. Pupil Premium, Opportunity Area, Index of Multiple Deprivation, Additional Needs etc). The funding is available for projects that lead to employment, accreditation, further education, training and integration. Applicants should offer innovation and an entrepreneurial approach, and strong evidence of consultation with young people in the developing the organisation's service. The closing date for applications is the 28th February 2020. To be directed to the funders website: click here

14. The Ouseley Trust (England, Wales and Ireland) Cathedrals, choral foundations, parish churches, choir schools and other relevant institutions which promote and maintain to a high standard the choral services of the Church of England, the Church in Wales and the Church or Ireland; grants are available in the following areas; Courses for individuals or groups Endowment grants for scholarships or bursaries Fees for individual choristers having places at recognised choir schools Purchase of liturgical music Other projects (e.g. outreach) of an innovative kind that are likely to further the object of the trust in a direct and effective way No maximum grants size is specified. 15. Funding for music and arts projects for people with disabilities (UK) The Austin and Hope Pilkington Trust has grants of up to £1,000 for projects improving opportunities and access for people with one or more of the following; Physical disabilities Learning disabilities Mental health difficulties The funding is available to registered charities with an annual income of between £1000 and £1 million. The closing date for applications is on the 28th February 2020 To be directed to the funders website: click here

16. Small Grants for Summer Play schemes (UK) From the 1st February 2020, charities, social enterprises and community interest companies with an annual income of under £100,000 will be able to apply for grants of £500 to £1,000 towards a play scheme that runs for a minimum of 2 weeks or 10 days during the summer holidays.. Grants can only be paid to registered charities. Non-registered organisations must give the full name and address of a registered charity in which they are trusted to accept a grant on their behalf. Applications will be reviewed in May by the agencies and closing date for applications will be published once the Fund has been opened. To be directed to the funders website: click here

17. Funding to help develop community businesses (UK) The Investors' Booster Programme is a funding scheme to support community share offers. It enables investors to invest up to £10,000 to match community shares in societies that can demonstrate higher than average levels of community impact, innovation and engagement. The programme will also provide development grants of up to £10,000 to help societies get investment ready and meet standards of good practice. Match funding will be in the form of equity held on equal terms with other community shareholders. The objectives of this new Booster Programme are to help disadvantaged and under-represented communities develop successful community businesses, especially in under-represented trade sectors, and financed through community share offers based on new forms of investment proposition, institutional support, and business appraisal methodologies. The programme is aimed at new and existing community businesses; it is not suitable for newly formed community groups that are in the early stages of developing a community business proposal. 18. Grants to support animal welfare charities (UK) The objectives of the Trust are to donate to UK registered charities whose purposes encompass one or more of the following: to benefit or protect animals to relieve animals from suffering to conserve wild life to encourage the understanding of animals. The Trust invites applications for funding, which are then reviewed against specific criteria, as set by the Trustees in accordance with the objectives of the Trust. 19. Royal Society of Chemistry - Outreach Fund small grants scheme (UK) Our Fund provides financial support to schools, individuals and organisations in order to enable them to run chemistry-based public and community engagement activities. Through the fund we aim to support projects that: maximise our members' outreach and engagement contribution offer teachers a range of effective curriculum-enriching activities and opportunities to further engage their students with outreach provide hard-to-reach audiences with inspiring chemistry engagement opportunities, delivered or coordinated by skilled people increase chemistry and chemists' influence in public discourse and decision-making in line with the findings of the Public Attitude to Chemistry research. 20. Grants of up to £30,000 Available to Support Disadvantaged Children (UK) Not for profit organisations such as special schools; registered charities; voluntary organisations; churches; and community interest groups; etc. can apply for grants of up to £10,000 per year for up to 3 years for projects that help children and young people overcome the effects of illness, distress, abuse or neglect; disability; behavioural or psychological difficulties; and poverty and deprivation. The funding is being made available through the BBC Children in Needs small grants programme. The closing date for applications is the 16th March 2020. 21. Funding for International School Exchanges (England) Travel grants of up to £15,000 are available for international secondary school and further education colleges in England to take your pupils on international school visits, through a new Department for Education programme in partnership with the British Council. The visit can be used to enhance any curriculum subject teaching; it does not have to be a language exchange, although these are welcomed; the grants are aimed at young people from disadvantaged backgrounds. Priority will given to projects focused on improving children's wellbeing during the period in which they move from elite to less advantaged backgrounds (e.g. Pupil Premium, Opportunity Area, Index of Multiple Deprivation, Additional Needs etc). The closing date for applications is the 14th February 2020 and visits must be completed by 31st May 2020. To be directed to the funders website: click here

22. Building Resilient Local Economies (UK) Organisations working within the UK who want to help transform financial systems into 'projects for social benefit' can apply for grants that promote local economic resilience or to support engines that will change corporate behaviours in pursuit of wider social objectives. The funding is being made available through the Friends Foundation - Building Resilient Economies programme. The closing date for applications is 12 noon on the 20th April 2020. 23. Grants to Promote and Secure Better and Safer Roads (UK) Community and bureaux of between £5,000 - £25,000 are available for research, education and community projects with the aim of promoting and securing better and safer roads in terms of design, engineering and aesthetics including enhancements of the experience of road users. Funded activity includes courses leading to qualifications related to traffic engineering and transport planning, research projects and programmes or schemes to improve the highway network and the roadside environment, for example roadside parks and open spaces. Deadlines for application are a little over two weeks before trustees' meetings. The next applicants meeting is the 21st April 2020. To be directed to the funders website: click here

24. Grants of up to £20,000 Available to Adult Hospices to Improve Buildings and Outside Spaces (UK) Adult hospices that are full members of Hospice UK and are based in the UK, Isle of Man or the Channel Islands can apply for grants of up to £20,000 for projects that improve the physical environment within which hospices deliver care. A total of £100,000 is available and the programme primarily supports capital costs but revenue costs that help deliver the capital activity can be included in the project costs. It is important that the project should demonstrate a direct benefit to patients and their families wellbeing. The closing date for applications is the 23rd March 2020. 25. Funding Available for Projects that Help Young People Support Each Other On the Move Up to Secondary School (England) Grants of up to £35,000 are available to secondary schools and community organisations in England for peer to peer support projects focused on improving children's wellbeing during the period in which they move from elite to less advantaged backgrounds (e.g. Pupil Premium, Opportunity Area, Index of Multiple Deprivation, Additional Needs etc). The funding is being made available through the Co-op Foundation's #Well Fund and it is anticipated that up to 8 projects will be supported. The Co-op Foundation welcomes applications from organisations working in partnership, including approaches which involve both voluntary and public sectors such as a collaboration between a school and community organisation. 26. Funding to Promote Swimming within the Community (UK) The Swimathon Foundation has announced that its Community Grants Scheme has opened for applications. The scheme offers funding of between £500 and £2,500 to groups who provide and promote swimming in their local community. This could include a grant towards providing swimming lessons targeted at a specific group or section of society; a grant towards equipment or improvements at a pool which will encourage either increased participation; a grant towards encouraging swimming participation from groups that may have a health need and can gain particular benefit. To be eligible for a Swimathon grant organisations need to be supported by pools that are participating in Swimathon. Some of examples of groups that Swimathon Foundation Community grants will support, but are not limited to community groups; swimming clubs; senior groups; youth groups; sports clubs; disability charities; scout groups; and healthy living groups; etc. The closing date for applications is the 13th March 2020. 27. Grant Programme Now Open for Projects Benefiting Clarion Housing Group Residents (England - Various Locations) Not for profit organisations such as constituted community groups, registered charities, companies limited by guarantee, PTA or Friends of School groups, social enterprises or Community Interest Companies working primarily for the benefit of Clarion Housing Group residents can apply for grants of between £1,000 and £5,000 for projects supporting residents, delivering local initiatives and improving neighbourhoods. The funding is available to eligible groups with an annual income of less than £500,000 where projects can be completed within 12 months. The closing date for applications is on 11th March 2020. 28. Sport England Launches New Major Event Volunteer Fund (England) Sport England has launched a new Major Event Volunteer Fund to address volunteer shortages within grassroots sports. The aim of the fund is to help national governing bodies, event hosts and other organisations make it easier and more attractive for existing volunteers at national sporting events to continue their volunteering experience in sport at a community level. The funding is available to national governing body or organisation hosting the major event that can demonstrate that they've a clear plan to support their major event volunteers and have identified appropriate steps which will maximise the transition rate of the volunteers into community sport volunteering opportunities. Grants of between £10,000 and £100,000 are available and the fund will be open to new applicants until January 2021. To be directed to the funders website: click here

29. Funding to Develop the Sustainability of Organisations Working with Unpaid Carers (UK) Not for profit organisations working with unpaid carers can apply for development grants of up to £80,000. The funding is available for up to three years. The grants can be used to enable organisations working with unpaid carers to make a step change such as diversifying their income streams or setting up a social enterprise to help them become more sustainable in the long term. The funding is being made available through the Rehabilitation Trust and the Trust also has a separate funding round for organisations working with the triangulation of offenders or ex-offenders. 30. Museum Association collections strategy and development grant The Esmée Fairbairn Collections Fund supports a range of projects that bring collections closer to people. We award this fund on behalf of the Esmée Fairbairn Foundation to projects that demonstrate the significance, distinctiveness and power of collections to people. Based on recommendations in the Empowering Collections report, we have introduced a new type of grant, dedicated to collections strategy and development. Grants of up to £250,000 are available for projects running for up to five years to support initiatives that use collections to support the established strategy of an organisation for a long-term benefit. This type of grant aims to accelerate the development of museums. It is committed to finding new ways to involve their audience and the communities with collections. It is designed to help organisations overcome some of the barriers of traditional project funding, so we will offer additional coaching to projects that could benefit from our skills and network. 32. Grants for Armed Forces Day Events (UK) The Ministry of Defence will be awarding £10,000 to help Communities to organise Armed Forces Day events. Armed Forces Day will be on the 27th June 2020. The grant will pay for up to 50% of the cost of the event. The remainder will need to be raised by the community. The funding can be used to pay for: Road closures required to allow for parades and marches Decorations, flags and banners Newspaper and radio advertisements to promote the event Marshalling, security and first aid arrangements for the event Insurance PA and communications systems To apply for this grant, applicants must first register their event on the Armed Forces Day website. 33. Institute of Mathematics Education Grant Scheme (UK) The Institute of Mathematics has announced that individuals working in Schools, Colleges of Further Education (FE) and Higher Education Institutes (HEIs) can apply for funding of up to £600 to run or attend an educational activity relating to mathematics. Activities supported include: Hosting a mathematics event, e.g. Maths Trails, Maths Competitions; Attendance at appropriate conferences; Travel expenses to attend appropriate events; Supply cover/relief for the teacher to attend the appropriate event; etc. Applications can be submitted at any time until the 30th November 2020. 34. Physical and Mental Health Projects (England, Scotland and Wales) Postcode Community Trust has re-opened its grants programme and the Trust was established in 2014 to support marginalised groups in obtaining the skills and resources to make positive changes within their own communities. Grants of £500 - £20,000 are available to registered charities, CICs and SCICs for projects that benefit communities through: Increasing participation in arts & physical recreation Improving community health & wellbeing Reducing isolation Other voluntary organisations e.g. sports groups, community interest companies and social enterprises can apply for up to £2,000. 35. People's Postcode Trust (Great Britain) The People's Postcode Trust's Grant Programme has re-opened for applications. People's Postcode Trust provides project-based funding in Great Britain under the themes: Promoting human rights; Combating discrimination; Preventing poverty. Grants of up to £5,000 Available for Projects that Help the Homeless (UK) Help the Homeless makes grants of up to £5,000 to small and medium sized charitable organisations (with a turnover of less than £1 million) whose aim is to help homeless people return to the community and enabling them to resume a normal life. Typically, such organisations may operate small or medium-sized residential or training facilities to assist homeless people. The closing date for the next round of funding is the 15th March 2020. 37. Funding Available to Reduce the Environmental Impact Packaging, Batteries or Waste Electrical and Electronic Equipment (UK) Over three years the Ecorestore Equipment Fund will invest £1 million in projects that can reduce the environmental impact of packaging, batteries or Waste Electrical and Electronic Equipment through innovation, or research in the UK. The Fund are looking to support ideas up to £150,000 that will go on to make a bigger impact beyond the initially funded project - especially those that may ordinarily struggle to get off the ground. Innovation could include an innovative awareness campaign, technology, initiative, process, trial or material, for example.
