New Funding Opportunities:

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Funding Overviews and hyperlinks: 1. Grants to Support Children's Health and Education

The next deadline to apply to the DM Thomas Foundation Central Grants Programme is the 5 February 2020. The Foundation distributes a total of around £200,000 per quarter. Grants of up to £30,000 are available per year for up to two years to registered charities for projects that improve education and health for young people in three key areas: Children and young people with disabilities

Children and young people who are sick in hospital Children and young people who are life limited (requiring palliative care) The Foundation is a small charity and generally will not make awards of over £30,000 (per year). Funding can be requested for one-off projects or for up to 2 years work. Applications from schools and hospitals are welcomed as long as they are made through an appropriate registered charity. If favoured, grant applications for up to £5,000 can be approved by the Director, up to £10,000 can be approved by the Grants Committee, and applications for more than £10,000 are recommended to the Trustees for final approval. 2. The Japan Society Small Grants Programme

Educational establishments such as schools and colleges as well as community-based organisations that wish to develop projects and events that promote an understanding of Japan and Japanese culture are able to apply for funding through the Japan Society's Small Grants programme. The awards support projects with an education or youth focus. Most awards are of £1,000 or less and should not, in principle, cover more than 50% of the total budget. Applications may be made at any time and applicants are informed of the decision within 4 weeks of receipt of the application. The Japan Society Small Grants give priority to projects:

Which enhance understanding and awareness of Japan and its culture With an education or youth focus •

Which include an element of participation •

Which focus on the local community or take place in the regions Applications may be made throughout the year; there are no deadlines. In most cases, decisions will be reached within one month of receipt of the application. To be redirected to the funders website click here

3. Building Resilient Local Economies

The next deadline for applications to the Friends Provident Foundation - Building Resilient Economies programme is 12 noon on the 20 January 2020. The programme aims to build a more resilient, fairer and sustainable economic system. Grants in the past have been up to £200,000 to cover capital or revenue funding, core costs or project costs. Activities funded will fit closely with the aims of the Foundation and deliver one of two key outcomes. These are:

Systems Change

Local Economic Resilience Under 'Systems Change' the Foundation will be looking to support projects that develop and demonstrate methods that will effectively change policy and corporate behaviours in pursuit of wider social objectives. Under 'Local economic resilience' the Foundation is looking to support projects that share learning about effective ways for communities to create more sustainable economic systems and retain more of the value generated. 4. Funding for Community Radio Stations

Ofcom, the UK's telecommunications regulator has announced that the Community Radio Fund has re-opened for applications until 5pm on the 5 November 2019. The Fund has been established to help support the core costs of running licensed community radio stations. Grants can be awarded to support:

Management

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- Fundraising to support the station Administration
- Financial management & reporting
- Community outreach Volunteer organisation and support.

Grants can only be made to community radio licensees that are broadcasting under a community radio license. Grant awarded in the past have ranged from £2,160 up to £19,717 with the average grant being £14,292.

5. The Rank Foundation – Pebble Grants Programme Registered charities and recognised churches which are raising money for capital projects (building work, refurbishment or the purchase of long-term equipment) or a one-off short term activity (such as an annual respite break or holiday for disadvantaged young people) can apply for funding through the Rank Foundation – Pebble Grants programme. To be eligible to apply the total project cost must be less than £1 million, the organisation must have an annual income of less than £500,000 and the organisation applying must already have raised a third of the total costs. Applications can be submitted at any time and the Foundation is currently accepting applications for the January 2020 meeting of Trustees. Organisations can only apply once every 12 months regardless of the outcome of their application.

6. Royal Society of Chemistry – Outreach Fund Small Grants Scheme Individuals and organisations such as researchers, museums, schools, community groups, not-for-profit organisations, arts groups and libraries can apply for grants of up to £10,000 to run chemistry-based events and activities for public audiences and in schools. Applications for school's engagement activities should demonstrate how the proposed activities will:

- Enrich student's chemistry education and not solely deliver the curriculum .
- Provide students with opportunities to explore chemistry through local contexts, • Demonstrate career opportunities and develop employability skills, • Provide opportunities which would not normally be accessible to the students tak-• ing part, e.g. for hard-to-reach student audiences. Applications for public engagement activities should demonstrate how the proposed activ-
- ities will: Increase chemists' visibility as approachable people
- Increase the publics' confidence in discussing chemistry Demonstrate the relevance of chemistry to everyday interests and concerns.

The Outreach Fund is split into two categories: small grants - up to £2,000 and large grants - between £2,000 and £10,000. The closing date for both the small and large grants schemes is the 13 January 2020. To be redirected to the funders website click here

7. Grants of up to £50,000 per Year Available to Support Disadvantaged Children Registered charities can now apply for funding of up to £50,000 per annum for 1, 2 or 3 years for projects that work with some of the most disadvantaged 0-3-year olds. Grants provided will support work which improves the life chances of 0-3-year olds by investing in early intervention and preventative work. The funding has been made available by the Sylvia Adams Charitable Trust and previously supported projects have included: Funding to investigate peri-natal mental health interventions •

Funding for a Nursery School learning mentor And a project to fund a specialist Family Engagement Worker at a women's prison. The closing date for applications in this round is the 15 November 2019. To be redirected to the funders website click here

8. Funding for Artists to Develop their Artistic Practice The next funding round of the Arts Council England's Developing your Creative Practice programme has re-opened for applications. Arts Council England is looking for exciting, ambitious proposals that allow applicants to take that important next step in the way they make their work. Applicants are encouraged to consider their long-term needs and proposals can cover creative research and development or building skills through international exchange. Examples might include:

Creative media and the wider creative industries e.g. film or audio, design or gaming Technology, including digital technology e.g. virtual reality or live streaming Other non-arts organisations or settings e.g. residential-care providers, or a sci-

Other non-arts cultural forms or sectors e.g. health and wellbeing, social inclusion, heritage or sport This fund is only open to individuals over the age of 18 years who:

Are living and working in England Have three years' creative practice experience outside a formal education context Are working in Arts Council England's supported disciplines i.e. they will be dancers, choreographers, writers, translators, producers, publishers, editors, musicians, conductors, composers, actors, directors, designers, artists, craft makers, and curators.

Awards of £2, 000 - £10,000 are made through quarterly rounds. Funded project activities can last up to one year. The closing date for applications is 12 pm on the 14 November 2019.

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9. Funding for Music Making Projects for Young People in Challenging Circumstances Schools as well as other not-for-profit organisations can apply for grants to fund developmental music-making projects for children and young people in challenging circumstances as well as for projects that support the development of the workforce, organisations and the wider music making sector. The funding is being made available through Youth Music, England's largest children's music charity, which provides funding for musicmaking projects. Youth Making's funding programme is made up of two separate funds. These are:

Fund A which offers small grants (£2,000 to £30,000) for high quality music-making projects Fund B offers medium-sized grants (30,001 - £150,000 per year for up to two

years) for larger programmes of work. In applying for funding schools will have to justify how the activities to be funded do not duplicate Department of Education funding. The closing dates for applications to Fund A is 5pm on the 6 December 2019 and Fund B 5pm on the 8 November 2019. To be redirected to the funders website click here

10. Funding Available to Improve Air Quality

The Department for Environment, Food & Rural Affairs has announced that Local Authorities can apply the latest round of funding to help local authorities improve air quality across England. Since it was established, the Air Quality Grant scheme has awarded more than £61 million to a variety of projects, benefitting schools, businesses and residents, reducing the impact on people's health and creating cleaner and healthier environments. Local authorities are encouraged to bid for a portion of at least £2 million of central government support for a wide range of projects to improve air quality. Applicants in previous years have been awarded funding to install electric vehicle charging points, improve cycling infrastructure and develop local online air quality resources. Priority will be given to local authorities where Defra's national air quality assessment identified and/or projected an exceedance. Priority will also be given to local authorities that have one or more Air Quality Management Areas (AQMAs). To be redirected to the funders website click here

11. Community Shares Booster Programme

Funding is available from the £3million Community Shares Booster programme which is being managed by Power to Change. This is an independent charitable trust that supports and develops community businesses in England. The programme provides existing community businesses that are either planning to make or have recently launched community shares offers with match funding of up to £100,000 in equity investment made on equal terms with other community shareholders. Development grants of up to £10,000 are also available to help societies get investment ready and meet standards of good practice. Applications are particularly welcome from areas in greater need (in the top 30% of Index of Multiple Deprivation) and will be accepted until December 2020. 12. Funding to Integrate the Armed Forces into their Local Community

Grants of up to £20,000 are available for projects that help integrate Armed Forces and civilian communities, and/or deliver valuable local services to the Armed Forces Community such as financial advice, housing, mental and physical health, employability or social support for serving armed forces personnel, veterans, and their families. The funding is being made available through the Armed Forces Covenant Fund Trust's Local Grants Programme and applicants are expected to have experience and a track record of working with the Armed Forces Community, as well as a good understanding of the issues facing them. The application must be from either: A registered charity

A local authority School;

Community Interest Company

Armed forces unit with a UIN. Applicants will need to work with Local Covenant Partnerships (LCPs). These are formed of the public, charitable, voluntary and business sectors and representatives from the armed forces. Local authorities often have an 'Armed Forces Champion' or someone in a similar role who should be the applicant's first point of contact. 13. Teacher Development Fund Opens for Applications

The Paul Hamlyn Foundation has announced that the Teacher Development Fund (TDF) has re-opened for applications. Through the TDF, primary schools working in partnership with other primary schools as well as arts / cultural organisations can apply for grants of up to £150,000 to develop the necessary skills, knowledge and confidence to support the delivery of effective arts-based teaching and learning opportunities in the classroom, and to embed learning through the arts in the curriculum. Applications should focus on: Primary schools

Supporting children and young people experiencing disadvantage Approaches which involve learning through the arts .

Long-term, inquiry-based projects which support teachers' professional development and learning

Promoting effective and equitable partnerships between schools and arts/cultural organisations and artist practitioners The contributions of school leaders and artist practitioners as both professional

learners and as supporters of embedding learning through the arts in the curriculum Approaches which involve any of the following art forms: crafts; creative writing,

including poetry; dance; design; film; music; opera; photography; digital arts and media; theatre and drama; the visual arts; and cross-arts practices. The Foundation expect to make around six grants to partnerships of arts/cultural organisations and up to ten schools, who will work together for two academic years. 14. Funding of up to £5,000 Available to Tackle Problems within Families Registered charities whose activities support and encourage the family to work as a cohesive unit in tackling problems that face one or more of its members can apply for grants of between £1,000 and £5,000 (but trustees will consider requests for higher amounts) through the Kelly Family Charitable Trust. The Trust will consider both capital and revenue grants. The Trust is happy to support requests for core funding as well as projectbased grants, and actively encourages applications from relatively new organisations to help them become established. The three areas of activity that the charity wishes to support are:

Interventions that support families and help them in ways that prevent the fracture • of the family unit, e.g. practical family support, relationship counselling, mediation Families where sexual abuse, physical abuse, domestic violence, alcohol abuse and drug abuse threaten the integrity of the family unit Prisoners and in particular their families, during and after the period of imprison-

ment. The trust prefers to support charities whose income is below £500,000. However, larger charities with pioneering pilot projects will be considered. The next closing date for applications is the 1 March 2020. To be redirected to the funders website click here

15. Grants Available to Develop New and more Efficient Ways to Produce Food The Government has announced that up to £20 million of grant funding is available to businesses to develop new and more efficient ways to produce the UK's food. The Industrial Strategy Challenge Fund Transforming Food Production Challenge will invest in large scale and ambitious projects that help UK food production break out of a traditional landbased model and move towards a sustainable position of net-zero emissions. Areas of work could include: Indoor growing systems

Aquaculture New food sources such as insects and fermentation-based systems. The project's total eligible costs must be greater than £1 million but less than £10 million and must start by 1 July 2020 and end by 31 March 2023. 16. Grants to Support Action for Marine Conservation Sea-Changers provides grants of up to £600 (£1,000 in exceptional circumstances) to a range of marine conservation charities and not for profit organisations. The projects funded will achieve one or more of the following objectives: To address the root causes of marine conservation threats and challenges in the

UK To prevent or reduce negative impacts on UK coastal and marine environments

and / or species To add to the body of knowledge about marine conservation threats and challenges in the UK.

Sea-Changers is particularly interested in grassroots projects which galvanise community action and in projects which increase the number of people taking action for marine conservation. Data and results from research projects undertaken as a result of Sea-Changers grant funding must be made available to Sea-Changers and shared with appropriate marine databases when completed. 17. Co-operative Bank - Customer Donation Fund

Organisations such as Registered Charities, Community Interest Companies, Cooperatives and Credit Unions; etc. that have a Community Directplus account with the Co -operative Bank have until the 31 March 2020 to apply for funding of up to £1,000 from the Customer Donation Fund. The money can be used to support special projects and fundraising activities; and all Community Directplus account holders are eligible to apply. To be redirected to the funders website click here

18. B&Q Community Reuse Scheme

DIY store B&Q operates a community re-use scheme through all its branches, the scheme donates unsellable products and materials for re-use by local schools, other educational institutions and community groups, for the benefit of the local community and the environment. All items are donated on the understanding that they will be re-used or disposed of responsibly if they are not used. Eligible groups include community garden projects, registered charities, schools and colleges, youth groups, Scouts and Guides, hospices, preschool groups and registered child minders. B&Q also works with Community Repaint, a network of schemes that collects any surplus, re-usable paint and redistributes it within their communities to individuals and families on low income, charities and community groups. Charities, community groups, colleges or schools interested should get in touch with B&Q. B&Q will add the organisation's details to their database of community groups. 19. Phase Two of the Community Housing Fund Opens for Applications Homes England has announced that Phase Two of the Community Housing Fund is open for applications until the 31 December 2019. The fund is making £163m available for affordable homes across England. Eligible applicants include community-led groups that want to deliver new affordable housing schemes. Local authorities and registered housing providers may apply on behalf of community groups to support them through this process. Phase Two bidding is now open for capital grants to fund the costs of acquiring land and

20. Grants of up to £5,000 Available for Local Community Projects The Charities Aid Foundation has announced that the Tourle Foundation Fund is open for applications. The CAF Tourle Foundation Fund seeks to award grants of up to £5,000 to local charitable organisations delivering services for local people. An example would be a charitable organisation set up by the community in a village, providing services to older people in isolation; a small community group on an estate providing drop in sessions for teenagers etc. To be eligible to apply, organisations must be able to evidence that the project will be delivered to local people and have an annual income of below £75,000. Priority will be given to organisations that find it difficult to attract mainstream funding. The closing date for applications is midnight on the 11 November 2019. 21. £1 Million Available to Help Rough Sleepers this Winter

Grants of up to £25,000 are available to frontline organisations to help end rough sleeping and to provide longer term solutions for people that are sleeping rough. Grants are available to provide additional accommodation during the period 1 December 2019 to the 31 March 2020 and / or to enhance the support provided in existing commissioned shelters to help rough sleepers secure a long-term move-on from shelters. This could include applications for training and workforce development or similar activities that enhance the quality of support provided in shelters. The funding is being made available through the £1 million Cold Weather Fund and is available to charitable organisations that are currently not commissioned by local authorities. The closing date for applications is the 6 December 2019.

22. Funding Available to Celebrate the Windrush Generation Councils and community groups have the opportunity to bid for funding to hold their own local events to celebrate and commemorate the positive impact of the Windrush Generation on modern Britain. A total of £500,000 is available for bids from charities and community groups. Grants of £2,500 and up to £25,000 will be awarded for innovative, active community engagement projects making a positive impact in at least one of three areas: celebration, commemoration and education. The funding is being made available through the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government and the closing date for applications is the 8 December 2019.

23. Funding for Research and Projects that Address Severe Learning Disabilities The Baily Thomas Charitable Fund is a registered charity which was established to provide both research and project funding in the area of severe learning difficulties, including autism for both children and adults. Grants are made to cover capital projects and core costs to include staff costs, general running and office costs at charitable organisations, schools and centres. Projects funded include: Capital works for residential, nursing and respite care, and schools •

- Employment schemes including woodwork, crafts, printing and horticulture
- - Play schemes and play therapy schemes Day and social activities centres including building costs and running costs Support for families, including respite schemes Independent living schemes
- Support in the community schemes Snoezelen rooms.

Applications will only be considered from voluntary organisations which are registered charities or are associated with a registered charity. Schools and Parent Teacher Associations and Industrial & Provident Societies can also apply. The next deadline for applications seeking funding in excess of £10,000 is the 1 January 2020. 24. Funding to Promote Public Engagement and Teaching of MicroBiology The Microbiology Society has announced that grants of up to £1000 are available for a variety of educational outreach activities to promote public engagement with microbiology. Funding is available to support relevant science teaching or promotion initiatives, or to support developments likely to lead to an improvement in the teaching of any aspect of microbiology. Full Concessionary or Postgraduate Student Members of the Microbiology Society can apply under the Microbiology Society Education and Outreach Grants Programme. Funding is available for talks, workshops, demonstrations, posters, leaflets, broadcasts, activities at science festivals and audio-visual or computer-based packages. Applications relevant to the teaching of any aspect of microbiology in primary, secondary or tertiary (including postgraduate) education will be considered. 25. Cure Parkinson's Trust Grant

Commercial organisations, appropriately qualified scientists or clinicians based in an accredited university or hospital in any country worldwide can now apply for funding for laboratory or clinical research projects. Projects should have the potential to advance knowledge that might lead to a cure for Parkinson's disease or that represent a substantial advance in treatment. The Cure Parkinson's Trust has a particular interest in projects that show the potential to delay, slow, stop reverse or prevent the progression of Parkinson's disease. There are no specific limits to the amount of funding available but previous awards have been between £50,000 and £250,000 with a duration of 1-3 years. Applications are considered four times a year, the next deadline for applications is the 12 December 2019. To be redirected to the funders website click here

26. Equipment Grants for Disabled and Disadvantaged Young People pols and not for profit organisations have the opportunity to apply for funding through the Wooden Spoon Society's Capital Grants programme. Wooden Spoon is the British and Irish Rugby charity which supports projects help mentally, physically disadvantaged children. Each year the charity supports around 70 projects. Through the programme funding is available for:

- Buildings and extensions
- Equipment & activity aids Sensory rooms and gardens
- Playgrounds and sports areas
- Soft playrooms. If a project is educational or disability sports-focused, there must be a key rugby element to engage children and young people. Applications can be made at any time. To be redirected to the funders website click here

27. Funding for Sensory Equipment for Schools that Cater for Pupils with Special Education Needs

SEN Schools can apply for grants of up to £5,000 to enable them to purchase a range of sensory equipment to help enhance the pupils' experience at school. To be eligible schools need to cater for young people under the age of 19 who have a physical/ sensory/ learning disability. Schools that cater for socially disadvantaged children or mainstream schools for children with behavioural problems are unable to apply. The funding is being made available through the Lords Taverners, the UK's leading youth cricket and disability sports charity. Schools are is required to pay a self-help contribution of around 25% of the total cost of the package. There are no application deadlines and applications can be submitted at any time and are reviewed on a quarterly basis. To be redirected to the funders website click here

28. Funding for Young Athletes

Talented able bodied and disabled British track and field athletes between 15 and 23 years old that are in financial need can now apply for funding from the Ron Pickering Memorial Fund. The fund exclusively supports young and deserving applicants in the sport of Athletics. Since the fund was introduced a total of £2million has been awarded in small but significant grants to several thousand young British Athletes. Each grant is designed to make a difference, helping the recipients make the difficult transition from junior to senior level through support for equipment, specialist coaching or travel and importantly help build the athletes' confidence and self-esteem through recognition. No minimum or maximum funding amounts are specified. The closing date for applications is the 30 November 2019.

29. Funding for Community Cohesion Projects The Allen Lane Foundation's Social Cohesion Programme, provides funding to support local communities in breaking down barriers and reduce tensions between different groups of people, and help to build a more cohesive and inclusive community. The aim of the funding is to:

- Proactively work towards building better community cohesion and trust, and encouraging respect and understanding in the local area Proactively promote the inclusion of marginalised groups and individuals in the life
- of the local community Fund work which breaks down barriers and tensions in the local community thereby reducing feelings of division and "them and us".

The Foundation is seeking applications from community-led grassroots groups and organisations which have a focus of work being at a very local/community level, which could be a housing estate or distinct community. The Foundation is particularly concerned about divisions in communities that occurred around the 2016 Referendum and subsequently. Applications will be particularly encouraged from areas of high deprivation but not exclusively and the Foundation is keen to support communities in coming up with their own solutions to local issues of division. New initiatives, those that may have been tried before or are on-going, are considered as long as the work has lasting benefits for those people the projects are aimed at. 30. Asda Foundation Grants for Local Community Projects

It will make a real long-term difference and will transform the community, improving the lives of those who live there. Grants awarded have previously ranged from £2,600 - £32,000 although no minimum or maximum amounts are published. 31. New £10 Million Fund Launched to Improve Rugby League Facilities

A new fund has been launched which is dedicated to improving the environments where Rugby League takes place; giving people more and better opportunities to engage with the game and to get active. The RLWC2021 Capital Grants Programme will invest in facilities and equipment that create environments that are accessible, welcoming and build a legacy of the 2021 tournament in local communities and will aim to invest in projects that offer opportunities for people from all different backgrounds to be active, across the men's, women's and wheelchair Rugby League games. Schools can apply but the facilities will need to be open to the wider community. Two levels of funding are available: Small scale awards of up to £15,000 and

Large-scale awards in excess of £15,000. Applications can be submitted at any time up until 23 October 2021 and decisions will be made approximately every 12 weeks. To be redirected to the funders website click here

32. EdTech Demonstrator Schools and Colleges Programme The Department for Education has announced the launch of the EdTech Demonstrator schools and colleges programme. The programme aims to identify Demonstrator schools and colleges who are using technology effectively, and who are keen to share their experience and support other providers. This may include:

Offering support and guidance on the effective use of technology to help reduce

teacher workload

Help create efficiencies Improve accessibility and inclusion Support excellent teaching and learning.

Applications for between £75,000 and £150,000 of grant funding are welcome from state funded primary and secondary schools and colleges working with 16 to 19-year olds. The level of funding made available to each Demonstrator will vary depending on the intensity of proposed activity and number of schools/colleges each provider will support. 33. Funding of Up to £10,000 Available to Tackle Social Deprivation Registered charities exempted or excepted organisations can now apply for up to £10,000 of funding for core costs and charitable activities that: Ease social deprivation

Enrich the fabric of the local community and the quality of life of individuals within that community.

The funding is being made available from the 1989 Willan Charitable Trust which, with the help of the Community Foundation. The Trustees prefer to prioritise projects for which the funding will represent a significant contribution to the delivery of the project. Grants here will not generally exceed £1,500. Projects that draw on the region's rich maritime tradition to deliver improvements in local quality of life or address deprivation. Gap year voluntary work through Project Trust. Grants are limited to a maximum of £500 towards expenses in undertaking a voluntary placement. Applicants must normally reside in the North East region.
