Peer on peer sexual abuse and sexual harassment

The Northumberland Strategic Safeguarding Committee is reviewing the approach of all partners to tackling peer on peer sexual abuse, following the recent Osted review.

To facilitate this work all partners are being asked to contribute valuable intelligence to this review by completing an audit tool, based on the NSPCC self evaluation. Schools, as partners, are being asked to complete the review by following the links below.

Arthur Labinjo-Hughes



The Government has launched a national review and local inspection to 'determine what improvements are needed by the agencies that came into contact with Arthur in the months before he died.'

Some may ask what the school was doing because at the time Arthur had become an 'invisible child', as he was not able to attend school due to lockdown. School was not able to see him each day (or question his absence) and identify his deteriorating condition,

physically and mentally. This daily check that schools do for so many children, is what helps to keep so many children safe.

The murder of Arthur Labinjo-Hughes was a tragedy, the explanations of what happened, as they emerge, are sure to be painful. Our response must be to apply the lessons of his death to our daily work towards a strengthened safeguarding and child protection system. We must continue to think that 'it could happen here' and to use our 'professional curiosity'

Update from the Schools' Engagement Sub Group

At the last meeting of the Schools' Engagement Group we agreed our priorities for the next year. Watch this space as we will be communicating with you through briefings, training and Safe to Learn on the work being undertaken, with your support, to achieve the agreed outcomes:

- 1. Schools are prepared and resourced to take appropriate action in their own school communities to challenge sexual abuse, violence and harassment.
- 2. Fulfil the extended duty of Virtual School Headteachers to promote the education of children with a social worker.
- 3. Education providers in Northumberland can provide assurance to the NSSP that the recommendations from case learning reviews have been fully implemented

White Ribbon Accreditation

Northumberland County Council has recently received White Ribbon accreditation following approval by the White Ribbon organisation of its three-year plan and zerotolerance approach to domestic abuse and sexual violence.

Early in 2021 the County Council made the decision to work towards White Ribbon accreditation to cement its commitment to ending domestic abuse and sexual violence in the county. The White Ribbon Organisation is a charity that works to encourage everyone, and especially men and boys, to make the White Ribbon Promise to never commit, excuse or remain silent about violence against women and girls.

White Ribbon Ambassadors are men who engage with other men and boys in their day to day lives to call out abusive and sexist behaviour among their friends, colleagues and communities to promote a culture of equality and respect.



Sexual violence and sexual harassment between children in schools and colleges

White Ribbon Champions are women who play an essential role by encouraging men to get involved and in finding opportunities to inspire and inform others through presentations, conversations and social media.

We urge our Northumberland DSLs to encourage staff and students in your school to support this. Work in schools towards the accreditation will support your RHSE/RHE curriculum and it will show that your school is committed to challenging sexual violence and sexual harassment between children in schools and colleges.

Northumberland Young Carers Toolkit for Education Settings



The Northumberland Young Carers Toolkit 2021 is now available on the SharePoint site for **DSLs in Schools and APs** in the Young Carers folder. The toolkit aims to support schools to increase awareness of the needs of Young Carers and to support you to put in place the reasonable adjustments

necessary to ensure Young Carers reach their full potential. It also offers guidance to support you to develop a Young Carers Policy.

The toolkit also offers advice on how to spot the signs that a pupil may be a Young Carer as well as how you can access the support available to Young Carers in your school.

Let's Talk About It - Working Together to Prevent Terrorism

Let's Talk About It is an initiative designed to provide practical help and guidance to the public in order to stop people becoming terrorists or supporting terrorism. The website provides a range of posters and videos that can be used within an educational setting to educate children, adults and parents/carers about the dangers of extremism and radicalisation.



Fearless



Fearless is part of Crimestoppers and is a safe place for children and young people to report crime anonymously. There is no need to pass on any personal information or details so children and young people can confidentially ask questions about crime, find out which behaviours and actions are criminal, and

find out the consequences of being involved in crime. They can also report behaviours and actions they have witnessed or are concerned about, without the fear of being identified.

There is a section on the website for professionals which includes resources to support you to deliver lessons on County Lines and educating children and young people on recognising the signs of County Lines, and how to report it. This can help protect children and young people from being groomed or exploited by criminal gangs. www.fearless.org

Reporting and Removing Abusive TikTok Videos – Advice for Schools and College Staff

An increasing number of schools have made reports around their pupils making explicit, offensive and harmful videos on social media identifying staff members or education settings, particularly on TikTok. The videos are either making reference to the school, or individual teachers themselves, through a variety of online



accounts. As a result, TikTok have been engaging with UK Safer Internet Centre to ensure there is action

being taken to quickly remove content.

TikTok has confirmed that the best way for schools and colleges to get content removed to is to report it through the <u>Professionals Online Safety Helpline - UK Safer Internet Centre</u>. The Professionals Online Safety Helpline has produced <u>an article and short video on how best to report content</u>. TikTok commit to removing content which breaches their <u>community guidelines</u>. Call the helpline on **0344 381 4772** or email helpline@saferinternet.org.uk.

Safer Internet Centre continue to work with TikTok, trade unions, the Children's Commissioner and other bodies to monitor the situation and consider if further action needs to be taken. It is clear that social media companies need to take immediate action against harmful content on their platforms.

It is never acceptable for anyone to harass or intimidate education staff. Some incidents may constitute a criminal offence and schools/colleges should report those they think may come into that category to the police. We know many institutions are already talking to students about these issues and UK Safer Internet Centre fully support schools and colleges in taking appropriate action against pupils and students who are identified as posting abusive content.
