School moves during school closure period

As some schools start to close and school hubs start to emerge, there may be times where children are required to attend other school sites. *These moves do not require a change in school roll*. <u>Government guidance</u> has been published to make sure the appropriate safeguarding arrangements are in place to support these moves and the Schools' Safeguarding Team has published a <u>checklist for schools</u> based on the guidance.

Child Protection policies – Covid 19

Following the publication of the <u>Guidance on safeguarding in schools, colleges and other providers</u> (published 27 March 2020) we have produced a template appendix which can be added to your current **Child Protection and Safeguarding Policy** and a checklist you can use to ensure you address all of the points raised in the new guidance. The resources were emailed directly to you and by the end of the week will be on our webpage to view and download.

Keeping Children Safe in Education Update

On 2nd April 2020 the DfE made a minor update to the current version of KCSIE by adding a link to the most recent Covd-19 guidance. The updated guidance can be found <u>here</u>

Operation Encompass and Operation Endeavour

It is extremely important throughout this pandemic period that Operation Encompass and Operation Endeavour notifications are checked daily. This will help to ensure that some of our most vulnerable children and young people can still be supported. If you receive an Encompass notification consider calling home, just to check things are okay. If you have the contact details of the victim use them and, wherever possible, ask if you can talk to the young person.

Working remotely

IMPORTANT NOTE:

Whilst many staff will be working remotely during the coronavirus outbreak, it is important to note that personal data must at all times continue to be processed and stored in accordance with data protection principles. You should not use personal devices to communicate with service-users, store personal data on personal devices or download and use apps onto work or personal devices (phones/laptops/tablet computers) without express authorisation from your manager.

Missing children – a message from the Police

A message from Lynne Colledge Detective Inspector (Safeguarding Strategic Support) in relation to Missing Children:

As you know the Prime Minister announced strict-stay-at-home measures for the public and enacted new legislation to support this.

The Government Guidance on 'Staying at Home' is clear. There is not a complete lock down. People are allowed to leave home for certain reasons including to 'provide care or to help a vulnerable person'. It is clearly not the intention of the Government to prevent parents (including corporate parents) from going to look for their children when they leave home without permission, or in breach of parental discipline. This is a parental issue. Unless there are some risk factors, such as they were seen to get into a car, or were extremely active on their mobile phones before leaving which is a previous indicator of them planning to meet exploiters, the police should not be contacted to report them missing until the professional carers have conducted reasonable actions to locate the child.

Northumbria Police's stance in terms of the new legislation is one of Engaging, Explaining and Encouraging first, with Enforcement being an absolute last resort. Any parents/carers stopped by police outside of their home address while trying to locate a child in their care will be dealt with sympathetically as this would be

seen as a "reasonable excuse" **Please reassure your parents and carers that they can still take reasonable steps to safeguard and locate the young people in their care.**

Domestic abuse

With continued concerns that the level of domestic abuse may increase during extended periods when families are social distancing, the following resources are available to share with families and on your websites.

These websites are updated regularly:

- <u>Women's Aid practical safety advice for survivors</u>
- SafeLives advice and information for survivors, professionals and policymakers
- The <u>Women's Aid</u> website has also been updated with the ability for survivors to do live chat as a means of contacting the Women's Aid national support service.
- <u>Bright Sky</u> is a free to download mobile app providing support and information to anyone who may be in an abusive relationship or those concerned about someone they know. The app is also designed to be used by professionals looking for information about issues around domestic abuse such as online safety, stalking and harassment and sexual consent. It looks like a weather app so the abuser wouldn't suspect if it was on a survivor's phone.

The <u>Safe and Together Institute</u> is providing advice on how domestic abuse support work might be adapted during the pandemic crisis.

All of our local DA and SV services are continuing to offer support (via phone and on line) and are still accepting referrals.

Remember for service users who are victims of domestic abuse, self or household isolation could mean they are at additional risk of abuse, trapped in their homes with their abusers and isolated from the people and the resources that could help them. Guides are attached and some important things to remember when having contact by phone:

- Check who else is in the house/room when you are talking
- Ask if they feel safe.
- Ask about what support they have, how they are managing with isolation/schools closing/social distancing.
- Consider use of 'closed' questions when asking about safety questions with 'yes/no' answers may help a victim of abuse share that they are being harmed.

The Dogs Trust Freedom Project is still up and running and taking referrals (free fostering service for dogs belonging to people fleeing domestic abuse).
