# Art Inspired By Music

How could you create a work of art to a piece of music? By drawing, painting, or even making a video! Lots of artists have been inspired by music, you could find music to paint to, maybe choose something relaxing to begin with. Or you could find a painting, and compose your own piece of music for it.

#### Stravinsky's Firebird BBC Ten Pieces

The BBC Ten Pieces at home is a great place to access really interesting activities based around pieces of classical music. Here is an 3D sculpture art activity based on the Russian composer Stravinsky's piece The Firebird. The music is very exciting, and so it might inspire you to make something really creative!

There are lots of these scores to watch online, some are for full orchestra pieces which can get very complicated! How does the graphic artist use colour and shape to describe what he is hearing? Does the graphic score help you understand the composition better?

#### **Songs About Artists**

You might have heard of the painter Vincent Van Gogh, or the English painter LS Lowry. They both had very unique style of painting, and their life stories inspired people to write songs about them.

#### L. S. Lowry

Did you know that Lowry visited Northumberland, and painted scenes of Berwick? Maybe you could draw a picture of your street in a Lowry style. The song Matchstalk Men by 1970s duo Brian and Michael is a tribute to the artist.

#### Vincent Van Gogh

Vincent Van Gogh painted using very bold colours and brush strokes. He was not famous when he was alive, but now his paintings inspire millions! You don't need to have oil paints to paint like Van Gogh, you can even use crayons, and there are online apps that can make your artwork look like one of his paintings.

#### **Graphic Musical Notation**

Graphic notation was used by experimental composers from the 1950s onwards. The musician uses the shapes, drawings, colours, or squiggles to to inspire or guide their performance.
