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A visit by Iman Sadiq to Amble Links First School



On the 25th June, Iman Sadiq from the Mosque in Blyth came to visit our school. He asked us if we had seen anyone dressed like him before – only a few hands went up. He then showed us his special prayer hat called a Topi and let us all have a look at it and try it on. It had lovely embroidery on it. He told us that he wears it to pray and that Muslims pray 5 times a day using a special prayer mat.

He then showed a clip of the Arabic alphabet set to music and we found out that there are 29 letters in the Arabic alphabet. We then looked at the Koran. The one that Iman Sadiq showed us was written in Arabic and English. It is a special book for Muslims, like the Bible is special to Christians and the Torah is special to Jews.

He finished by telling us a little bit about Ramadan, which was due to start, and what children do at this time – they can try to fast from about the age of 8. He also invited us to visit him at the Mosque in Blyth. We are looking forward to going soon.

The hymn we sang was called "All things bright and beautiful".

On Saturday 18th May, 41 Year 8 students and 4 staff from Richard Coates CE Middle School, Ponteland, set sail from North Shields to Amsterdam. The purpose of the trip was to explore aspects of the Holocaust they have studied in RE.


After a smooth crossing, we arrived and checked in at the hostel. The itinerary was packed and there was very little time before we were leaving to visit the Rijksmuseum and familiarise ourselves with Amsterdam on a canal boat cruise.

Days two, three and four were equally jam-packed and included visits to the Jewish History Museum to see its Holocaust exhibition, the Portuguese Synagogue and the

Anne Frank House, and a guided tour around Kamp Westerbork, the transit camp where Anne Frank was initially imprisoned. We were lucky to have excellent guides wherever we went and everyone approached each visit with enthusiasm and interest. It was amazing to see first-hand what we had learnt about in class, and to put some of our learning into context.

The trip was interspersed with visits to a theme park, the Hard Rock Café and even an evening of disco bowling! The visit concluded on Friday 24th May and, after a rough ferry crossing home, we finally made it back to school.

The trip was a fantastically memorable experience for everyone, and so much was



learnt over such a short period of time. Memorable quotes from the students include: "An amazing trip. Anne Frank's House was so interesting and it was so strange to actually be standing where she did," and "I had such a brilliant time, I really enjoyed everything we did and would recommend it to anyone who likes a packed itinerary!"
