Footpath KP.8) Public Path Diversion Order, 1974*

Notice is hereby given that on the 25th March 1974 the Northamptonshire County Council confirmed the above-named Order.

The effect of the Order as confirmed is to stop-up that length of public footpath KP.8 in the Parish of Harpole which extends from its junction with Glassthorpe Lane for a distance of 133 yards in a south-westerly direction and to create a new footpath leading from Glassthorpe Lane 117 yards north-west of the terminal point of the existing footpath in a southerly direction for a distance of 87 yards to rejoin the existing footpath.

*Description of Conservation Area in the Rural District of
Hexham*

From the river bank which forms the south-west boundary of the Conservation Area, the line runs up to
F2

Well Bank, then follows the south and west perimeter of Orchard Vale, skirts Corbridge Town Farm on its west and north sides, then turns south down the Stagshaw Road. To the south of West Cheynes the boundary turns eastwards, skirting the backs of properties at the west end of St. Helen's Street and then runs east along St. Helen's Street as far as Woodbine Terrace. From here it runs north up the back of St. Wilfred's Road, turns east to take in Windsor Terrace and the Vicarage then turns south down Princess Street as far as Prospect Cottage. It then runs down the side and back of Prospect Cottage eastwards along Appletree Lane and round to the main road A.69. Turning west the boundary runs along the main road then down the lane to the east of Byethorne House and along the southern perimeter and so back to the river.

STOKE-ON-TRENT CITY COUNCIL

Designation of Conservation Areas

Notice is hereby given that Stoke-on-Trent City Council pursuant to section 277 of the Town and Country Planning Act, 1971 have designated as Conservation Areas:

(a) the area of land situated in Longton, Stoke-on-Trent bounded to the west by Chadwick Street, to the north by Uttoxeter Road, to the south by Normacot Road and to the east by a line drawn between Normacot Road and Uttoxeter Road alongside the western boundary of the Albion Works, comprising the Gladstone and Roslyn Potteries and adjoining lands, two derelict public houses, two derelict residential properties, a derelict warehouse and a small private car park; all of which said area is more particularly shown on a plan marked "Gladstone Pottery and Environs Conservation Area";

(b) the area of the land situated in Ash Green Stoke-on-Trent, bounded to the west by Stone Road, to the north by the boundary between open space incorporating Longton Brook and recent housing development, to the east by the rear boundary fences to properties fronting the north side of Brook Road and the western side of Brinsley Avenue and on the south partly by Longton Road and partly by the rear boundaries of residential properties situate to the south of the junction of Longton Road with Stone Road, comprising numerous residential properties fronting Longton Road, a large open space area, a commercial garage, a Council Depot, a Post Office Repeater Station, a Pump House and an Electricity Sub-Station; all of which said areas is more particularly shown on the plan marked "Ash Green Conservation Area".
