SCHEDULE

Length of road in the Metropolitan District of Doncaster in the County of South Yorkshire

That length of Clay Lane at Long Sandall which extends from its junction with Clay Lane West and Little Lane in a generally north-easterly direction to a point 310 yards north-east of the north-easterly side of its junction with Thorn Lane, a total distance measured along the said length of road of approximately 895 yards. WEST YORKSHIRE METROPOLITAN COUNTY COUNCIL

The West Yorkshire Metropolitan County Council (Leeds) (Traffic Regulation) (No. 24 & 25) Orders 1976

Notice is hereby given that the above Council, in exercise of their powers under sections 1, 54 and 84D of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1967, as amended, propose to make the above Orders.

The effect of the proposals will be to make permanent Orders in respect of the present experimental bus lanes as follows:

- (a) *Leeds No. 24 Order*—on the eastern side of Dewsbury Road, Leeds, between its junction with Moor Road and Tunstall Road from 4 p.m. to 6.30 p.m. (Mondays to Fridays).
- (b) *Leeds No. 25 Order*—(i) on the north-eastern side of Kirkstall Road, Leeds, between its junctions with Haddon Road and Willow Road from 7.30 a.m. to 9.30 a.m. (Mondays to Fridays), and (ii) on the south-western side of Kirkstall Road and Kirkstall Road (south) Service Road, Leeds, between the junction with Viaduct Road and a point 94 yards south-east of the Service Road's junction with Harmer Street from 4 p.m. to 6.30 p.m. (Mondays to Fridays).

The proposals also provide for the revision of the existing morning and evening peak period no waiting and loading restrictions respectively, so that they coincide with the operative times of the bus lanes.

There are the usual exemptions for vehicles which apply in Bus Lane Orders.

Copies of the proposed Orders, together with plans showing the proposals and a statement of reasons can be inspected at Room 226, County Hall, Wakefield, and at the Traffic Unit, Dopet, Merrion House, Merrion Way, Leeds 1, during normal office hours until 16th July 1976.

Objections to the proposals should be made in writing together with the grounds on which they are made to the undersigned quoting reference PT/DC/5/L/102/75/24 or PT/DC/5/L/102/75/25 as appropriate. Objections must be received not later than 12 noon on 16th July 1976.

Conservation Area at Eglington

Conservation Area at Whittingham

Notice is hereby given that the Alnwick District Council as Local Planning Authority in exercise of their powers under section 277 (1) of the Town and Country Planning Act, 1971, and after consultation with the Northumberland County Council have designated the areas referred to in the Schedule hereto as Conservation Areas. The areas are ones which the District Council consider to be of special interest,

the character and appearance of which it is desirable to preserve and enhance. Future development in the areas will be subject to strict planning control designed to secure the preservation of the character and the general improvement of the areas. No buildings in the Conservation Areas can be demolished without the consent of the District Planning Authority. The District Council must be given six weeks' notice of any proposals to cut down, chop, top or uproot any tree in the Conservation Areas.

Copies of the plans showing the areas, together with statements of the District Council's reasons for designating them as Conservation Areas, may be inspected during normal office hours at the office of the Chief Secretary of Alnwick District Council, at the address given below.

SCHEDULE

Description of Eglington Conservation Area in the District of Alnwick

Commencing opposite Cockhall Farm on the Wooler Road the boundary proceeds southwards along the western side of the Cheviot Walk plantation as far as the Beanley Road from which point it proceeds along the road north-eastwards beyond the cricket ground until a small copse (field 4732) on the east side of the road is reached. Passing to the south of the copse the boundary proceeds generally eastwards along the southern boundaries of fields 5535, 7929, 0332, 1226 and 1724 (i.e. along the south side of the village) until the Eglington Burn is reached. The Burn is followed south-eastwards through the coniferous plantation to the eastern end of the latter. Joining the Alnwick Road the boundary then proceeds eastwards to the corner of the field 4200 (opposite the sewage works) from which point it turns back towards the village along the north boundary of field 4200 to Eglington Terrace. Proceeding first westwards along the Terrace towards the village and then north along the east boundaries of No. 2 Eglington Village and field 2436 the boundary then skirts the northern side of the village along the southern boundary of fields 1757 and 9260 and along the Eglington Burn which is followed upstream as far as Rocks Plantation near Cockhall, from which point it turns south along the eastern edge of the plantation to the Wooler Road and then west along the road to the starting point.

Description of Whittingham Conservation Area

Commencing at a point opposite the Castle Inn on the west side of the Alnwick Road the boundary proceeds westwards along the southern boundary of field No. 284, the rear garden boundaries of properties on the south side of the square and the northside council houses. Continuing in the same direction along the Callally Road as far as the Back Loaning the boundary then proceeds northwards along the west side of the Loaning as far as the Eslington Road. It then skirts the western and northern boundary of the Vicarage Grounds until the public footpath is reached. Following the public footpath to the churchyard wicket gate the boundary proceeds generally eastwards along the churchyard wall, the rear of the Memorial Institute Hall, the school field and along the southern boundary of field No. 277 as far as the Glanton Road. Crossing the Glanton Road the boundary then proceeds southwards (taking in the roadside trees) along the field boundary (field No. 310) to Bridge End (Hole in the Wall Cottage). Passing to the rear of the cottages the field boundary is followed to the sewage works site and then after crossing the River Aln the boundary passes to the rear of Havanna Cottage and the Castle farmstead from which points it follows the stone wall in the north-west corner of field No. 287 to join the Alnwick Road. Crossing the road the boundary proceeds along the west side of the road toward the Castle Inn and the starting point.
