

RECORD OF DECISION TAKEN BY CORPORATE DIRECTOR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF LOCAL SERVICES: BARRY ROWLAND

PROPOSED PARKING RESTRICTIONS ELVASTON ROAD, HEXHAM

Purpose of Report

To consider the results of the public consultation exercise, regarding proposed parking restrictions on Elvaston Road, Hexham, (see attached consultation plan in appendix A).

Recommendations

It is recommended that:

1) A 'No Waiting 8am to 6pm' restriction is provided on Elvaston Road.

Key Issues

- 1) Councillor Homer is addressing parking and traffic issues in the area.
- 2) Public parking occurs on this section of Elvaston Road.
- Parked cars force traffic into the middle of the road, resulting in conflicts with oncoming vehicles which cannot be easily seen due to a bend in the road which obstructs forward visibility.

Link to Corporate Plan

This report is relevant to the *Places and Environment Aim* in the Corporate Plan:

Our aim is to maintain and further improve the quality of our towns, villages and countryside and make it easier for residents to access services and high quality, affordable homes and to travel using different modes of transport. To achieve this, we will keep Northumberland clean, green and safe from detrimental impacts of climate change, build more houses to benefit those most in need and provide a convenient, integrated public transport network.

Background

- 1. Officers are working with Councillor Homer to address parking and traffic issues in this part of Hexham.
- 2. Despite the introduction of free parking, all day parking by town centre employees still occurs on Elvaston Road.
- 3. This parking causes traffic to move out into the middle of the road.
- 4. This section of Elvaston Road includes a bend which restricts forward visibility.
- 5. The end result is that traffic often meets 'head-on' with little warning.
- 6. In addition, traffic that has been forced into the middle of the road by parked cars cannot be seen by drivers exiting Elvaston Park Road and private driveways. This has led to a number of 'near misses'.
- 7. Parking also occurs at the junctions of adjoining cul-de-sacs which also affects visibility.
- 8. A site meeting was held with local residents and Councillor Homer on 13th November 2014
- 9. At that meeting it was agreed that a 'No Waiting 8am to 6pm' restriction (single yellow lines) would be appropriate as it would prevent parking by town centre employees during the day but enable residents and visitors to park outside those times.

Consultation

- 10. The proposal was the subject of a consultation which concluded on 29th December 2014. The consultation letter is attached as Appendix B.
- 11. The consultation exercise involved the delivery of a consultation letter together with a plan showing details of the scheme to residents, statutory consultees; County Councillor Homer, Hexham Town Council; road user organisations; and other interested parties. The proposal was also available to view and comment via the Council's website. A plan showing the scheme is attached as Appendix A.

- 12. 17 responses were returned. 15 were in favour of the proposal (88%), 2 against (12%). A summary of the responses is attached as Appendix C.
- 13. Many of those who responded in favour were strongly in support of the proposal.
- 14. Some respondents made reference to 4 hour parking bays further down Elvaston Road, stating they are rarely used. It was suggested the Council could consider removing these bays, however they are also part of an existing residents permit parking scheme. Some further investigation will be undertaken and the issue will be discussed with Councillor Homer separately.
- 15. One statutory consultee responded. The North East Ambulance Service recognised and appreciated the need for the scheme and supported the proposals.
- 16. Hexham Town Council stated that they had no objections to the proposal.

Conclusion

17. It is recommended that, in view of the results of the consultation exercise, the No Waiting 8am to 6pm restriction is provided.



Proposed Amendments to Parking Restrictions - Elvaston Road - Hexham

Concerns have been raised by residents regarding visibility for vehicles exiting Elvaston Park Road and nearby driveways due to the curve of Elvaston Road. In addition, parked cars in this area can cause oncoming traffic to be in the centre of Elvaston Road which can lead to conflict with joining traffic. With this in mind, I am writing to you to find out your views on providing a 'No Waiting 8am to 6pm' parking restriction in Elvaston Road, at and near the junction with Elvaston Park Road, as shown on the enclosed plan.

I am therefore writing formally in accordance with Regulation 5 of the Local Authorities Traffic Orders (Procedure)(England and Wales) Regulations 1996 (as amended) to ask for your comments on the proposals as above and shown on the enclosed plan.
