Proposed Country Park Car Parks - Introduction of new tariff structure 3 April 2018

Cabinet Member: Glen Sanderson - Environment & Local Services

Purpose of Report

This report sets out the background to the proposed implementation of a new tariff structure for Country Park Car Parks at Bolam Lake, Druridge Bay and Plessey Woods Country Parks.

Recommendations

It is recommended that the new tariff structure be implemented for Countryside Car Parks.

Key Issues

- The reintroduction of parking charges is proposed at Bolam Lake, Druridge Bay and Plessey Woods Country Parks in order to finance a significant capital investment programme at these sites that will improve the quality and range of facilities being offered to park users.
- 2. The investment programme also makes some provision to take forward improvements at the other country park sites where parking would remain free of charge.
- The proposal involves the introduction of a new tariff structure in the following Country Park Car Parks - Plessey Woods, Druridge Bay and Bolam Lake

Background

The decision to introduce charges and the tariff structures were covered in the capital strategy group report that sets out the business case for the parks investment programme. This has been through Cabinet and the income is also part of the MTFP (Medium Term Financial Plan) approved through full Council.

This new tariff structure will only impact on the following Country Park Car Parks - Plessey Woods, Druridge Bay and Bolam Lake.

Northumbria Police, other emergency services and relevant statutory consultees were notified of these amendments as part of the process for making the permanent Orders. Comments and observations are invited from members of the public as part of the Traffic Regulation Order legal process.

Since the removal of parking charges I have seen the numbers of people using the park increase you only have to walk around the lake, woods or grass areas to see young families, the elderly, dog walkers, runners in fact a wide range of Northumberland folk and visitors using this great facility. We can attend museums free of charge but to visit the great outdoors is now going to cost us again. A healthy outdoor option in this age of encouraging activity to beat obesity is being put out of reach of those unable/unwilling to afford these charges. I am unsure as to how the proposed charges have been decided upon, the first hour free. Why, personally I cannot walk around the lake or even enjoy a leisurely cup of coffee at the visitor centre and short walk within an hour. Which group is this 1 hour free for. Make it first two hours free and it makes sense. Then it jumps to £1.60 and £3.00 these high charges will just encourage parking along the beach roads outside the lake by those in the know. The annual parking permit is quite high at £35 again how was this figure agreed, Through Spring, Autumn and Winter any one who works can only visit at weekends in times when the park closes 5-6pm. please think again and if these charges have to go ahead reduce the costs especially the annual charge for local people who use this facility and are already having to find increases in council tax and garden waste collection charges.

To find more funding increase costs for the events held throughout the year on site, especially those that include camping/ caravanning as last year the amount of rubbish left on occasions was appalling.

I am writing to express my objection to the parking charges being introduced at the country parks in Northumberland. Whilst walking at Druridge Bay country park I saw a small notice which displayed the proposed charges.

I live locally to the park although not within walking distance. Walking around the lake and wooded areas with my dog meeting up with friends and passing the time of day with other park users is a big part of my life. For the last two years I've watched the swans raise and fledge 7 cygnets, counting them on every visit. I've seen swimmers brave the lake, children learn about the outdoors and unfortunately been dismayed by the litter left after caravan, camping and music events. I hope you see that this facility is very important to me and other users.

I am a single wage earner not on a high wage. I would find the annual charge difficult to pay in a lump sum but the daily charge would severely limit the number of times I would be able to visit the park. If that's impossible think about the possibility of reducing the annual charge which may even encourage visitors to the area to purchase it as well instead of just visiting for the free hour.
