Proposed Introduction of new 20 MPH Speed Limit Restriction at Darras Hall First School

05 June 2018

Cabinet Member: Glen Sanderson - Environment & Local Services

Purpose of Report

This report sets out the background to the proposed implementation of traffic safety improvements for the new Darras Hall First School.

Recommendations

It is recommended that the new 20 mph Speed Limit is introduced together with highway requirements for the Section 278 agreement for the new school. These requirements include: a revised Traffic Regulation Order; amendment to crossing points at Broadway roundabout; and the provision of pedestrian guard rails at the entrance footway to prevent students from running into the road.

Key Issues

- This report covers highway safety improvements related to the new Darras Hall First School.
- The provision of 20 MPH speed limit adjacent to Darras Hall First School, in line with County Policy will help to improve road safety in the vicinity of the new school. This element of the work will be funded through the Local Transport Plan.

3. Highway improvements are required as part of the Section 278 agreement for the development of Darras Hall First School. This element of the work will be funded by the developer.

Background

Introduction of 20 MPH Speed Limit

The introduction of a 20 MPH Speed Limit adjacent to Darras Hall First School is part of the 2018/19 LTP. This is part of the County Council's road safety initiative to introduce 20 MPH speed limits adjacent to all schools in Northumberland, provided it is feasible to do so.

Consultation took place between NCC Officers, Local County Councillors, the Parish Council and the school Head Teacher, who are all fully supportive of these proposals.

Northumbria Police, other emergency services and relevant statutory consultees were notified of these amendments as part of the process for making the permanent Orders.

A plan showing the extents of the 20mph speed limit is attached as Appendix A.

Highway Conditions of Section 278

Following the planning application for the development at Darras Hall First School, there were a small number of conditions which were required to improve safety on the Highway:-

- a revised Traffic Regulation Order;
- amendment to crossing points at Broadway roundabout; and,
- the provision of pedestrian guard rails at the entrance footway to prevent students from running into the road.

A plan showing the improvements being introduced at the Broadway roundabout is attached as Appendix B.

Amendment to the existing Traffic Regulation Order

One of these was an amendment to the existing Traffic Regulation Order (changes to yellow line restrictions)

A consultation took place in November 2017 to ask for comments regarding the amendments to the existing parking restrictions on Middle Drive. These changes were required as a result of the development of the new school and more specifically the creation of a main access to the school car park from Middle Drive. A copy of the consultation letter and plan is attached as Appendix C.

Delegated Decision

The consultation was issued to 30 residential properties and approximately 30 statutory consultees. Four responses were received, three of these were from residents with one being from Northumbria Ambulance Service who did not express a preference. The responses received are detailed in Appendix D, however the results of the responses received are as follows: 1 in favour of the proposed changes, 2 against and 1 did not express a preference.

Taking these responses into consideration and following further discussions with the school, the consultant for the developer and NCC Officers, it was agreed to proceed with a revised plan of restrictions, which removed the single yellow lines at the west of the School Keep Clear Markings (which did not allow parking between 9:30am and 2:30pm) and replaced these with double yellow lines. A plan of these restrictions is attached as Appendix E.

It is considered that these minor changes will compliment the proposed 20 MPH speed limit, by creating a No Waiting and School Keep Clear - No Stopping Area at key times, but still allow an area to "drop off" at school times (single yellow line restrictions). This will allow greater visibility adjacent to the school on Middle Drive for all road users at peak times.

The Emergency Services and other relevant statutory consultees will be notified of these amendments as part of the process for making the permanent Traffic Regulation Orders.

2. Revision of crossing points at Broadway Roundabout

This improvements to the existing crossing points at Broadway roundabout, will allow for greater visibility for all road users.

3. Provision of pedestrian guardrail on Middle Drive, Darras Hall at the new pedestrian accesses to the new school.

The provision of pedestrian guardrail will allow greater safety for pupils, staff and visitors exiting the school via the new footpaths.

Consultation took place between NCC Officers, Local County Councillor, the Parish Council and School Headteacher who all fully supported these proposals to the revision of the crossing points and the introduction of pedestrian guardrails.

It is anticipated the works for both schemes can be completed in August 2018, in preparation for the new school year.





<u>Proposed Amendment to Existing Parking Restrictions</u> <u>U9083 Middle Drive Darras Hall Ponteland</u>

With the amendment of the access to Darras Hall First School, it is proposed to amend the "Waiting and Loading Restrictions" (single yellow lines and yellow keep clear zig-zag lines) on Middle Drive Ponteland. Please note: This amendment applies to the north side of the carriageway only, all other existing restrictions in the area will remain unchanged.

I am therefore writing in accordance with Regulation 5 of the Local Authorities Traffic Orders (Procedure) (England and Wales) Regulations 1998 (as amended) to formally advise you on the proposed amendment to the "No Waiting between 9:30am to 2:30pm" and "Keep Clear Monday to Friday 8am to 5pm" parking restrictions at Middle Drive, Darras Hall, Ponteland, as shown on the attached plan.

The County Council is seeking your views on the proposals and a freepost response form is attached to facilitate the consultation process. It should be stressed that this is a genuine consultation and that comments received will be carefully considered.

Regrettably, it is not possible to reply to individual comments, but you may wish to note that comments may be included in a Decision Report, to the Executive Director of Local Services and Housing and may be available for public inspection. The closing date for any comments you may wish to make is Friday 5th January 2018. 
