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Proposed Resident Permit Parking Zone between 9.30am - 3pm and 3.30pm - 8.30am - Sycamore Street, Ashington Cabinet Member: Glen Sanderson - Environment & Local Services

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### **Purpose of Report**

To consider the introduction of resident permit parking on Sycamore Street, Ashington.

### Recommendations

It is recommended that the following parking restrictions are introduced Resident Permit Parking Zone (RPZ) between 9.30am - 3pm and 3.30pm - 8.30am Everyday on Sycamore Street, Ashington.

### **Key Issues**

- 1. Residents have raised concerns about indiscriminate parking by non-residents, causing parking problems on Sycamore Street.
- 2. This introduction of a resident parking scheme will be funded by Councillor Wilson, using his Members' Local Improvement Scheme allowance.
- 3. The proposed scheme is supported by Councillor Wilson and NCC's Parking Services Team.

### Background

Indiscriminate parking by non-residents is making it difficult for residents to park. After meeting with Councillor Wilson, officers proposed that resident permit parking restrictions may assist in alleviating these concerns. Resident Permit Parking is generally implemented to control parking and to discourage commuter parking so that they make better use of more appropriate off-street facilities.

#### Consultation

A consultation letter was sent to 29 residents and 18 statutory consultees inviting comments on the viability of introducing 'Resident Permit Parking to Sycamore Street. A copy of the consultation letter and plan are attached in Appendix A.

12 responses were received with 10 in favour 2 against the proposal. A summary of the responses is attached as Appendix B.

A detailed consultation letter was sent to 29 residents and 18 statutory consultees inviting comments on introducing Resident Permit Parking Zone (RPZ) between 9.30am - 3pm and 3.30pm - 8.30am on Sycamore Street. A copy of the consultation letter and plan are attached in Appendix C.

9 responses were received with 6 in favour and 3 against the proposal. A summary of the responses is attached as Appendix D.

#### **Assessment and Recommendations**

The results of the consultation and proposed scheme were discussed with Councillor Wilson, who agreed that the restrictions should be introduced.

Councillor Wilson is funding the scheme through his Members' Local Improvement Scheme allocation.

It is anticipated this flexibility will allow a drop -off facility for non-residents in the area, but maintain the integrity of the scheme for Permit Holders. This dual use approach to Resident Permits Schemes throughout the County have proved successful for all types of road user.

Enforcement will be coordinated and carried out by NCC Parking Services.

# Proposed Resident Permit Parking Zone Sycamore Street, Ashington

Concerns have been raised by residents of Sycamore Street in Ashington about indiscriminate parking by non-residents, causing obstruction issues and parking problems.

Councillor Wilson has therefore agreed to fund the introduction of a residents permit parking zone only if there is a favourable consultation with residents.

I am therefore writing in accordance with Regulation 5 of the Local Authorities Traffic Orders (Procedure) (England and Wales) Regulations 1996 (as amended) to formally ask for your comments on the proposals, to introduce a 'Residents Parking Zone' at Sycamore Street, Ashington.

Signs would be erected as necessary indicating where Resident Permit Parking is in operation. Bays would not be provided within the zone as they are not required for this type of restriction. To cover administrative costs, residents will be asked to purchase Resident Parking Permits. (Currently £25 a year per permit, equivalent to £2.08 per month). A maximum of 2 permits can be provided per household with one permit reserved for residents and one for visitor parking.

After all the hassle over the last year, with school been built why couldn't it be free for at least one year and visitors permit at a reduced price after that. There's a car park adjoining school not been used. Why can't parents drive in and drop children there.
NE63 0HQ	1		The Street is often full of cars of non residents, either at the School (not only picking up and dropping off, but also of the staff, who instead of using the staff car park, park on the street taking up residents parking spaces) or at the salvation army or to go to the shops at the Piv. There is also more recently the garage at xx-xx Holly street which has begun operating as a business, working on cars all hours of the day and often up to 10pm at night not only through the week but also at weekends, disturbing residents who need to sleep as they work shifts. The garage also often has several cars parked outside on the street, sometimes as many as six, including recently a car with no licence plate, no wheels and no doors or back end which was parked on the street covered with a tarp for 2 weeks. Meaning that I often can't get parked not only outside my house but in the lane at all and have to park at the end of the lane on the Main Road.

# Proposed Resident Permit Parking Zone Sycamore Street, Ashington

In November 2019, all residents of the above area were consulted on the above proposals. The consultation exercise ended on 10th January 2020, and responses were received from 12 consultees with 10 in favour, 2 against and 0 neither for nor against the proposed measures.

Following this consultation, this matter has been investigated further by way of site meetings and in house meetings with representatives of the Highways Programme, Parking Services and Design Teams.

We are now in a position to reconsult on proposals to help alleviate indiscriminate parking by non residents which causes obstruction issues and parking problems.

To maximise parking availability and to ensure a consistent approach is taken throughout the area, the following measures are proposed, and detailed on the attached plan.

- 1. Introduce 'Resident Permit Parking only Zone F9 9.30am 3pm then 3.30pm 8.30am' on Sycamore Street.
- 2. This will allow for pick up and drop off at the school but stop all day parking by non residents.

Councillor Wilson has agreed to fund the introduction of a residents permit parking zone subject to favourable consultation with residents.

I am therefore writing in accordance with Regulation 5 of the Local Authorities Traffic Orders (Procedure) (England and Wales) Regulations 1996 (as amended) to formally ask for your comments on the proposals, to introduce a 'Residents Parking Zone' at Sycamore Street, Ashington as shown on the attached plan.

Signs would be erected as necessary indicating where Resident Permit Parking is in operation. Bays would not be provided within the zone as they are not required for this type of restriction.
