Proposed Residents Parking Zone North View Back Lane, Ashington

6th February 2017

Purpose of Report

To consider the consultation regarding the proposed removal of the existing parking restrictions (single yellow lines) and the introduction of a Resident Parking Zone (RPZ) on North View Back Lane, Ashington.

Recommendations

It is recommended that the current restrictions remain and a Resident Parking Zone (RPZ) <u>not</u> be introduced on North View Back Lane, Ashington.

Key Issues

- 1. This area has been the subject of concerns over a period of time i.e. indiscriminate parking causing obstruction to residential properties causing concerns for the residents and the local County Councillor.
- 2. The Scheme was to be funded and supported by County Councillor Thomas Wilson.
- 3. The results of the consultation showed support from residents for the proposals, however, objections were received from the Town Council, local businesses and the Town Team. There was also an objection from council's parking services officers who were concerned that due to the nature of the narrow street they would not be able to enforce a Resident Parking Zone at this location.
- 4. Following discussion between NCC Senior Officers and Councillor Wilson the decision has been made not to proceed with the proposal.

Background

- Concerns were identified to Councillor Wilson by residents on a number of occasions, with regard to obstruction of their garages by parked vehicles.
- 2. The existing restrictions; No Waiting and Loading between 8am and 6pm (single yellow line) (monday to saturday) on both sides of the road do allow parking during the evening and night. This facility is primarily used by residents and under the terms of the order the businesses can load continually for a 30 minute period between 8am and 6pm.
- 3. It was proposed to remove the existing parking restrictions and introduce a Residents Parking Zone (RPZ) at all times, supported by No Waiting At Any Time restrictions (Double Yellow Lines) on certain areas of the street as shown on the consultation plan attached. This would help provide parking for the residents of North View Back Lane at all times.
- 4. This scheme was proposed prior to the refurbishment works taking place on Station Road, Ashington. This has resulted in a conflict with the proposal for North View Back Lane i.e.due to the limited capacity for unloading on Station Road and the back lane being traditionally used as a 'service access' for businesses.
- 5. North View Back Lane, like Station Road Back Lane (on the south side of Station Road) are primarily used as service access for Station Road businesses during the day.
- North View is narrow and becomes restricted, particularly when businesses on Station Road receive deliveries or refuse collections. The 'narrowness' is exacerbated by large business refuse bins left in the back lane. See photographs (see Appendix C)

Consultation

- These proposals were the subject of a consultation exercise, conducted on the 14th June 2016. This involved the delivery of a consultation letter to 18 residential properties, 29 business premises and 21 statutory consultees, including the emergency services and various disabled and transport associations/organisations. A plan showing the proposals is attached together with a copy of the consultation letter (see Appendix A).
- 2. The consultation exercise ended on 12th July 2016 and responses were received from 19 consultees, with 13 in favour, 5 against and 1 who was neither for nor against the proposal. A summary of the responses is attached as Appendix B.

- 3. As expected a significant number of residents were in favour of the proposals, however, objections were received from local businesses and in particular from council parking services officers who explained why they would struggle to enforce this proposal.
- 4. An objection was also made by Ashington Town Council, highlighting that the County Council is currently undertaking a full strategic parking study of Ashington Town Centre specifically to address parking needs. Therefore, they cannot support the proposal at the present time.
- 5. Councillor Wilson was notified of the results of the consultation.
- 6. Councillor Wilson after discussions with Council Officers regretfully confirms he does not wish to proceed with the scheme.

Recommendations

- 1. The proposal was made by Councillor Wilson who understood there was a good level of local support for the scheme.
- However, in view of the conflict of restrictions with Station Road (highlighted previously in this report), together with the objections of the Town Council and further discussion with NCC Senior Managers Councillor Wilson no longer wishes to proceed with the proposal.
- 3. Councillor Wilson and Officers will continue listening to the residents and road users' needs in the area and take forward information received via the Directory of Requests where appropriate.

Proposed Residents Parking Zone North View / Station Road Back Lane, Ashington

Concerns have been raised by residents regarding the lack of parking on North View, Ashington with Councillor Wilson, who has requested that Officers formally consult residents on a proposal to remove the existing parking restrictions and replace them with a Residents Parking Zone supported by No Waiting at Any time restrictions, (Double yellow lines).

I am therefore writing in accordance with Regulation 5 of the Local Authorities Traffic Orders (Procedure) (England and Wales) Regulations 1998 (as amended) to formally ask for your comments on the following proposals:

To introduce a 'Residential Parking Zone' and 'No Waiting at Any time' traffic regulation order at North View in Ashington as shown on the attached plan.

Signs at the entry to the street would dictate where Resident Permit Parking is in operation. Bays would not be provided within the zone as they are not required for this type of restriction. To make this scheme enforceable, residents will be asked to purchase Resident Parking Permits. (Currently £15 a year per permit equivalent to less than 30p/week). A maximum of 2 permits can be provided per household with one permit reserved for residents and one for visitor parking.

The County Council is seeking your views on the proposals and a freepost response form is attached to facilitate the consultation process. It should be stressed that this is a genuine consultation and that comments received will be carefully considered.

Regrettably, it is not possible to reply to individual comments, but you may wish to note that comments may be included in a Decision Report, to the Executive Director of Local Services and Housing and may be available for public inspection. The closing date for any comments you may wish to make is Tuesday 12th July 2016. If you wish to respond to this consultation online, please visit the web address http://trafficconsult.northumberland.gov.uk/.

I would urge you to take the opportunity to comment on this important matter as any decision taken will be based upon the responses received from residents who take time to return the consultation form.



		1	Thank you for your letter dated 14th June 2016 in which you invite us to offer our comments on the above proposal. I would inform you that as Emergency Service we may be required to use the above road(s) for access and egress in the event of being activated to attend an emergency call, or to convey patients to hospital for outpatient appointments. I would thank you for your consultation on this matter and offer our support for the ongoing road safety programme.
	1		We (Parking Services back office) have looked at the letter and proposed restrictions and have some feedback. We feel the proposed restrictions may not work for a number of reasons. North View is a very narrow street and may become congested with vehicles making it very difficult for vehicles (especially larger vehicles) to enter and exit. Garages back onto the street and residents or visitors may park in front of the garages causing an obstruction. Parking Services would be unable to enforce if the vehicle is displaying a valid permit and this would become a police issue. Commercial buildings back onto North View and delivery vans currently park on the yellow line to load or unload. If residents are parked on the opposite side of the street a delivery lorry entering or exiting would cause significant problems. The vehicles may not have anywhere to park to load or unload. Whilst we appreciate the residents have limited parking on North View we feel the resident scheme would not work due to the points raised above.

	1		On April 27 2016 I attended county hall to meet with Neil, Ali, Dan and Terry for your discussions regarding TRO proposals. We discussed this possible scheme at length and it was agreed that this was not possible to introduce. The lane is very narrow. If we introduce a resident scheme this will significantly increase the volume of cars in the lane. On the south side we have a large amount of businesses who require large wagons to access the rear of the property. When parking opposite a car with a residents permit the lane will become blocked. What we have at present is working fine. In my opinion this is a totally unworkable scheme and should be discarded.
